MESSAGE FROM THE SUPERVISOR



Assistance to Small Businesses

Last month, I partnered with City departments and other district Supervisors to announce efforts to assist businesses in San Francisco impacted by ADA (Americans with Disabilities Act) lawsuits. Often, the expenses of the litigation plus potential repairs mean the difference between staying in business and closing. Many businesses may not have been aware of the Federal requirements or did not have the financial ability to fix the problems.

After working with the Office of Small Business, Mayor's Office on Disability, Treasurer & Tax Collector's Office and the Department of Building Inspection, our office spearheaded an effort to educate businesses of these important issues and to partner with organizations to make loans available. The City is also partnering with Opportunity Fund, one of the Bay Area's largest micro-lenders, to provide loans for small businesses that need assistance with financing construction costs for ADA improvements. Opportunity Fund has pledged \$1 million to provide small businesses with capital loans ranging from \$1,000 to \$50,000.

City Budget

Recently, I was appointed to serve as Chair of the Budget & Finance Committee at the Board of Supervisors. Over the next six months, I will be working with city departments, community members and organizations, and the Mayor's Budget Office to develop a balanced budget for the 2011-2012 fiscal year. The City is currently projecting a deficit of \$380 million for the next year. This projection may change depending on new information like state budget impacts or the state of the economy.

The Board of Supervisors Budget Committee will deliberate on the city's budget in May and June, with a formal public comment session to be held in June. SUNSET CO-OP, BACK TO SCHOOL!

After demolishing its 58-year-old building in August 2009 and spending 16 months at a temporary location on Brotherhood Way, Sunset Cooperative Nursery School has returned to its home on Lawton at the Great Highway. The rebuild project was possible thanks to several extremely generous donations and grants, as well as four years of fundraising and hard work by director Laura Ossa and the preschool's parents, teachers, and alumni. The school is now housed in a beautiful modern structure designed by Rich Gillern and built by Noel Fox, both co-op parents. Most important, the children are happily playing in the wonderful new building and the refurbished play yard. Sunset Co-op celebrated their re-opening with dozens of current and former students and families, and many more supporters from the Sunset District community. The red tower landmark at Lawton and the Great Highway stands taller and prouder than ever. Congratulations Sunset Co-op!









ASIAN ART MUSEUM

San Francisco's Asian Art Museum is one of the largest museums in the western world devoted exclusively to Asian Art. With a rich array of programs, lectures and classes for all ages, the Asian Art Museum is a treasured resource for San Francisco.

Unfortunately, due to the global economic downturn, the Asian Art Museum is facing serious financial



difficulties. The City and the Asian Art Museum Foundation, the private fundraising arm of the Asian Art Museum, recently announced a proposal to restructure the Foundation's \$120 million bond debt. Another component in preserving and sustaining the Asian Art Museum will be a three-year capital campaign, led by members of the Board of Supervisors including Supervisor Carmen Chu, City Attorney Dennis Herrera, and former Mayors Willie Brown and Gavin Newsom.

GGNRA DOG MANAGEMENT PLAN

The Golden Gate National Recreation Area (GGNRA), a Federal agency, recently released their Dog Management Plan/Draft Environmental Impact Statement. The voluminous document and its recommendations would have significant impact on use of Ocean Beach, Fort Funston, Lands End, Sutro Heights, Baker Beach, Fort Point, Fort Mason and Crissy Field. The Dog Management Plan/Draft Environmental Impact Statement presents several different alternatives for each park in the GGNRA, ranging from "no dogs" to severely restricting off leash areas. Our office wanted to make you aware that public comment on the plan will be accepted through April 14, and that it is important that the GGNRA and National Park Service (NPS) hear the concerns of San

Francisco residents.

TRANSPORTATION PLANNING FOR THE FUTURE - Your input needed!



The San Francisco County Transportation Authority is in the process of updating the San Francisco Transportation Plan (SFTP), the long-range, comprehensive transportation plan for the city. The SFTP is the city's transportation blueprint, identifying goals, needs and investment priorities for our transportation system for the next 25 years. As such, the SFTP will shape the city's next generation of transportation projects, programs and policies and help the city achieve its broader sustainable development goals.

The Association of Bay Area Governments (ABAG) predicts that by 2035, San Francisco will have approximately 150,000 additional residents—the current population of Santa Rosa—and a comparable number of jobs. The goals established for the SFTP by the San Francisco County Transportation Authority are:

- Provide and sustain a world-class transportation infrastructure
- 2 Strengthen San Francisco's regional competitiveness
- 3 Create a more livable and equitable city
- **4** Ensure a healthy environment

The Authority's work on the SFTP is being overseen by a Technical Advisory Committee made up of public agency representatives and a 19-member Community Advisory Committee representing a wide range of interests and neighborhoods. SFMTA EXTENDS DEADLINE FOR SENIOR & YOUTH CLIPPER CARD

The San Francisco Municipal Transportation Agency (SFMTA), which operates the Municipal Railway (Muni), announced that the deadline for Muni Youth and Senior discount monthly pass customers to switch to Clipper has been **extended from January to May** in order to provide additional opportunities for Senior and Youth pass customers to apply for and receive their Clipper cards. Senior and Youth Muni customers must begin purchasing their passes on Clipper cards by the end of May. You must apply for a youth or senior card in person at the Muni Customer Service Center, located at 11 South Van Ness Ave., San Francisco. The following forms of identification are accepted as proof of your eligibility:

- Birth Certificate
- Driver's license issued by any state
- Identification card issued by any state
- Alien Registration/Permanent Resident Card
- Matricula Consular/Consular Identification Card
- Passport
- SF City ID Card

MUNI riders may use any of the following outlets to either purchase their monthly pass or to add cash value to their card:
