[Senate Bill 1751-Mandatory Homeless Death Count Reporting]

Resolution urging the California State Legislature to adopt and Governor Gray Davis to sign Senate Bill (SB) 1751 authored by State Senator John Burton, which would mandate local municipalities to report the deaths of homeless persons for each calendar year, institute the creation of a state homeless death count and providing public access to said information.

WHEREAS, Currently there are very few statewide and local programs providing for the reporting of the death of homeless persons in California; and,

WHEREAS, The knowledge of this information is integral in our ability to expand and allocate funds for the creation and preservation of existing services as well in understanding the depth of the issue, and accordingly the necessity to deter future and preventable deaths of homeless persons; and,

WHEREAS, It is incumbent that local governments institute homeless death reporting programs to ensure consistency in their allocations and operations of programming and services and as well create a framework to ensure centralized sharing of data and client services information in order to provide efficient and reliable planning, programming and services; and,

WHEREAS, Senate Bill (SB) 1751, authored by Senator John Burton, would mandate local municipalities to report the deaths of homeless persons for each calendar year; and,

WHEREAS, SB 1751 would establish that the Director of the State Department of Health Services institute and ensure the creation of local reporting programs in municipalities throughout California; and,

WHEREAS, SB 1751 seeks to centralize and integrate local information of homeless death counts and implement a yearly report which would be submitted by the Department to the Legislature, the Governor, and the State Legislative Analyst regarding the death of homeless individuals in the State of California for the previous calendar year; and,

WHEREAS, SB 1751 defines a homeless person to which this program would effect, as any person who has a fixed and adequate nighttime residence for fewer than 30 consecutive days, including persons who temporarily reside under certain specialized living conditions; and,

WHEREAS, SB 1751 would ensure the centralization and efficiency of information regarding the death of homeless persons throughout California in order to serve to expand the state and local government's policies and efforts to assist homeless persons; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco does hereby urge the California State Legislature to adopt and Governor Gray Davis to sign Senate Bill 1751, authored by State Senator John Burton, which would mandate local municipalities to report the deaths of homeless persons for each calendar year, institute the creation of a state homeless death count and providing public access to said information; and, be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco supports Senate Bill 1751 and does hereby ask that copies of this legislation be sent to our state representatives and His Honor the Mayor, with instructions that all actions be taken for its successful passage.
