[Recycling and resource conservation in the consumer catalog industry.]

Resolution urging the consumer catalog industry to use 50 percent post-consumer recycled paper for catalogs, to preserve natural resources, to conserve landfill space, and to reduce air and water pollution associated with the manufacturing of virgin wood-fiber paper.

WHEREAS, the preservation of the world's remaining forests is essential to the future of life on Earth because forests stabilize our climate, protect water and air resources, are home to indigenous cultures, and serve as our storehouse of biological diversity; and

WHEREAS, eighty percent of the world's natural forests has been destroyed or disturbed by human activities thereby creating an urgent, need for forest conservation efforts and

WHEREAS, the catalog retail industry exacts a tremendous environmental and social cost by publishing an average of 59 catalogs per year for every man, woman, and child in the United States, amounting to 17 billion catalogs per year and

WHEREAS, over 95 percent of all consumer catalogs contains no post-consumer recycled fiber; and

WHEREAS, 3.35 million tons of paper are used annually for catalogs, contributing to thousands of acres of clear-cut forests in the US and around the world, and

WHEREAS, many of the catalogs published by the catalog industry are used once and thrown away, contributing to a crisis in our landfills where almost half of the waste disposed is reusable wood and paper products; and

WHEREAS, the catalog industry typically gets a low single digit response rate, which means that often over 95% of the catalogs manufactured are ignored by the recipients, which is a waste of natural resources; and

WHEREAS, the paper industry is currently the third largest industrial emitter of greenhouse gases, and switching to production of recycled paper requires on average 27 percent less energy; and

WHEREAS, The City and County of San Francisco, in its Resource Conservation Ordinance, requires City Departments to purchase post-consumer recycled paper for all copier, printing, and writing products; and

WHEREAS, The Annual Catalog Conference 2003 will be held at the Moscone Center in San Francisco June 1-3, which is the world's largest catalog event; now therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that the Board of Supervisors respectfully urges the catalog industry to exercise environmental responsibility by implementing steps to significantly reduce its use of paper, and by utilizing post-consumer recycled paper for at least half of its paper needs; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED that the Board of Supervisors respectfully requests that the catalog industry cooperate with local and national forest preservation efforts and recycling initiatives, and to ensure that pulp and paper it uses does not come from or disturb endangered forests and intact forest landscapes.
