Resolution declaring the month of September 2006 as Reentry month in the City and

County of San Francisco.

WHEREAS, The California Department of Corrections housed 162,064 inmates in 1999, the largest prison population in the nation and four times the amount since 1980; and

WHEREAS, The number of prisoners leaving California prisons has skyrocketd in recent years from 14,620 in 1978 to 50,832 in 1988, and 124,697 in 1998; and

WHEREAS, In 2000, approximates 125,000 felons left prison, 6,000 youth prisoners were parolled from the California Youth Authority, and more than 200,000 inmates left California county jails; and

WHEREAS, Of the 500,000 parolees who leave U.S. prisons annually, 17.2% live in California; and

WHEREAS, Only one in every 10 parolees access services available through a corrections program and only 6 percent in employment programs; and

WHEREAS, Half of parolees are illiterate, only 10 percent access literacy services, and many have long histories of criminal or gang involvement and little marketable skills; and

WHEREAS, Currently, more than 75 percent of California adult parolees return to prison; and

WHEREAS, Most parolees have been released to parole systems that provide little services, which ensures that the recidivism rates remain high and public support for parolee and inmate services remains low; and

WHEREAS, 65 percent of 115,000 parolees have drug problems only 6 percent receive services; and

and

WHEREAS, Researchers estimate that 20 of homeless adults have a criminal record;

WHEREAS, In 2004 58,725 parole felons were sent back to prison, and only 1 in every 5 complete his or her parole term; and

WHEREAS, California spending on parole services was cut 44% in 1997, resulting in a near-doubling of parole caseloads to a ratio of 82 parolees for each parole officer; and

WHEREAS, At a time when San Francisco is experiencing an epidemic of violence, ensuring that parolees are supported and prepared to reenter society is crucial to restoring peace on our streets; and

WHEREAS, A broad coalition of public officials including the Public Defender, District Attorney, Sheriff, and the Board of Supervisors have come together with city and state departments and community-based organizations to form the San Francisco Safe Communities Reentry Council; and

WHEREAS, The goal of the San Francisco Safe Communities Reentry Council is to promote the safe and successful return of formerly incarcerated individuals to the community and develop a comprehensive support system to reduce recidivism and promotes public safety; and

WHEREAS, The San Francisco Safe Communities Reentry Council is holding a summit titled "Making Rehabilitation Work: Creating Opportunities for Formerly Incarcerated Individuals" on September 27, 2006 to build bridges and to the community and craft a comprehensive plan for reentry for San Francisco parolees; and

RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco declares September 2006 as "Reentry Month" in the City and County of San Francisco.
