[Reducing Pharmaceutical Prices]

Resolution supporting City, State, and Federal efforts to reduce pharmaceutical prices and increase transparency of the pharmaceutical rate-setting process.

WHEREAS, over 18,000 San Franciscan signatures were collected to place

Proposition D on the ballot for the November 2013 election, which would make it official City

policy for San Francisco to employ all available resources to reduce the cost of

pharmaceutical medications; and

WHEREAS, supporters of Proposition D included a broad coalition of San Francisco advocacy organizations who represent those who are disproportionately affected by rising drug prices because of chronic medical conditions, including the AIDS Healthcare Foundation, Senior & Disability Action, San Francisco Women's Political Committee, San Francisco Labor Council, and numerous others; and

WHEREAS, San Franciscans voted overwhelmingly to pass Proposition D in November of 2013, thereby giving the City an urgent mandate to take action to reduce pharmaceutical prices; and

WHEREAS, The Department of Public Health spends over 23 million dollars on purchasing pharmaceuticals for its patient population; and

WHEREAS, Drug manufacturers contend that information as to how the rates for various pharmaceuticals are set are trade secret protected and subject to other regulatory prohibitions on disclosure; and

WHEREAS, Public entity purchasers must rely upon the manufacturers' representations that the prices quoted are the lowest available, even with discounted drugs covered by federal programs; and

1 WHEREAS, The Department of Veterans Affairs purchases prescription drugs at lower 2 prices than those provided by manufacturers to the City; and 3 WHEREAS, Government entities covered by The Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of 1990, which enacted the Section 340B discount program that provides these entities with 4 5 significantly discounted drugs for outpatient care are unable to obtain pricing information; and WHEREAS, in July, 2011, the "340B Improvement Act of 2011" was introduced that 6 7 would have extended 340B pricing to the inpatient setting but the bill was defeated; and 8 WHEREAS, Governor Brown vetoed Senate Bill 746, authored by Senator Leno, which 9 would have required health plans and insurers to disclose a greater degree of information on a variety of aspects of charges and rates, including prescription drugs; the City had taken an 10 official position in support of Senate Bill 746; and 11 12 WHEREAS, the 2003 Federal Medicare Prescription Drug, Improvement, and 13 Modernization Act brought drug manufacturers tens of millions of new customers funded by 14 taxpayers yet prohibits the Medicare program from directly negotiating lower prescription drug 15 prices with pharmaceutical manufacturers; and WHEREAS, The City must explore all means to reduce the price of pharmaceuticals for 16 17 its patients and price transparency as part of a broader set of strategies to reduce costs; now, 18 therefore, be it RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors urges the Department of Public Health to 19 20 explore the feasibility of using consumer websites that provide price comparisons for specific 21 medications by the residents of San Francisco; and, be it FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors asks the City to pursue 22

2	transparency in pricing for health care and prescription drugs; and, be it

5	pharmaceutical rate-setting process.
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
