Project Description: The 113,400-square-foot project site located at 950 Mason Street (Assessor's Block/Lot: 0244/001) includes the entire city block bounded by Mason Street to the west, Sacramento Street to the north, Powell Street to the east, and California Street to the south in the Nob Hill neighborhood. The proposed project includes two main components: the renovation of portions of the historic 1906 Fairmont Hotel building, a Landmark structure (City Landmark Number 185), and the construction of a new residential tower on the site of the existing 317-foot-tall, 28-story hotel tower and podium, parking and hotel support uses built in 1961. Specifically, the project sponsor proposes the following actions: 1) retain the historic 1906 Fairmont Hotel building (approximately 557,453 gross square feet (gsf)); 2) consolidate some existing hotel rooms; that is, reduce the overall number of hotel rooms in order to enlarge some of the small hotel rooms for a net loss of approximately 60 rooms in the historic 1906 Fairmont Hotel building; 3) reconfigure some of the existing hotel uses; 4) demolish the existing 226-room, approximately 356,800-gsf, 317-foot-tall Fairmont Hotel Tower, which includes the 23story tower above a five-story, 50-foot-tall podium and associated hotel uses built in 1961; and 5) construct a new 317-foot-tall residential tower and podium structure consisting of a 26-story tower and a five-story, 55-foot-tall mid-rise residential component above a five-story, 50-foot-tall podium totaling approximately 620,656 gsf. Mayor's Teacher of the Month Recognition Award

Commencing May 2006, Mayor Gavin Newsom establishes the San Francisco Mayor's Teacher of the Month (MTM) Recognition Award to honor outstanding San Francisco public school teachers for their dedication, professionalism, and work on behalf of our City's young people. Teachers receiving this award will be nominated for excellence in their classroom, their school, and their City. From these nominations, a joint committee of representatives from the Mayor's Office, Office of the Superintendent, United Educators of San Francisco, and a blue-ribbon panel will select the individual award recipients to be honored each month of the school year. The Mayor's Office has worked in partnership with the San Francisco Education Fund, the San Francisco Unified School District, and United Educators of San Francisco to establish the criteria, nomination, and selection process for this award.

Process for Selection

- Nomination: Teachers will be nominated at each school site and within the District at large by parents, youth, other educators, administrators, and any other community members.
- Selection Committee: There will be a two-step selection process. First, a committee of representatives from the Mayor's Office, Office of the Superintendent and United Educators of San Francisco will review each nominee and unanimously approve that a nominee be forwarded to a blueribbon panel for final selection. Then, the blue-ribbon panel shall select the final recipients of the award for each month by consensus or majority vote. The blue-ribbon panel shall be appointed by the Mayor and may include youth, parents, community-based organizations, community members and business representatives.

Nomination/Selection Schedule: The nomination and selection process will occur yearly and one teacher per month during the school year (10 teachers per year) will be honored in accordance with the following schedule:

October 1, 2008

On-line nomination period opens.

February 13, 2009

Nomination period closes. The Mayor's Office and SFUSD oversees the implementation of Steps Two through Five of the nomination and selection process, outlined above, to select recipients to receive an award for each month.

May 2009

Mayor and Superintendent announce teacher award recipients.

 - Excellence in the Classroom.
 - O Excellence in the School.
 - o Excellence in the City.

Teacher of the Year Award

Mayor's Principals of the Year Award

Mayor Gavin Newsom has established the San Francisco Mayor's Principals of the Year Award (MPYA) to recognize outstanding San Francisco public school principals for their dedication, professionalism, and work on behalf of our City's young people. This special recognition is a collaborative effort with The Mayor's Office, San Francisco Unified School District, United Administrators of San Francisco, The San Francisco School Alliance and the generous sponsorship of Comcast. Principals receiving this award will be nominated by the community – parents, youth, educators, administrators, and other community members – for excellence as leaders in their school and their City. The process for nomination and the eligibility requirements are set forth below in detail.

Process for Nomination and Selection

• **Process.** The Mayor's Principals of the Year will be chosen through the following five-step nomination and selection process:

Step-One: Nomination. Parents, youth, other educators, administrators, and any other community members may nominate a principal during the open nomination period. The application for nominations shall be an on-line form accessed on the City's website. The application form will be accepted in Chinese and Spanish languages.

Step Two: Notification/Written Consent. The Mayor's Office will inform all principals who have been nominated and seek their written consent, as set forth below, for being considered. Nominees who provide written consent will be considered for selection as provided in the following steps.

Step Three: Selection Committee. The Mayor has convened representatives from the Mayor's Office, Comcast, Office of the Superintendent of the San Francisco Unified School District (SFUSD), United Administrators of San Francisco and San Francisco School Alliance to serve on the Selection Committee. The Mayor's Office will coordinate with the Office of the Superintendent to ensure that each nominee, who has provided written consent, meets the minimum qualifications. The Selection Committee will then review each nominee and unanimously approve that a nominee be forwarded to a Blue-Ribbon Panel for consideration. The Selection Committee will consider the application for nomination and may conduct additional due-diligence, including, but not limited to, consulting the Assistant Superintendents (SOIS) and other central office staff.

Step Four: Blue-Ribbon Panel. A Blue-Ribbon Panel, which shall be appointed by the Mayor, shall recommend for selection the final recipients of the award by consensus or majority vote. In appointing the Blue-Ribbon Panel, the Mayor shall select at least one youth, one parent, one representative from a community-based organization, and one representative from the business community to serve.

Step Five: Mayor's Selection. The Mayor shall review the recommendations put forth by the Blue-Ribbon Panel and select the final recipients to receive the award. The Mayor's Office will inform all awardees of this decision.

Nomination/Selection Schedule: The nomination and selection process will occur once yearly in accordance with the following schedule:

We have received your Notice of Conditional Award dated January 7, 2009 for the above referenced Bid (copy attached). As you are aware, PME Babbitt Bearings (PME) provides off-site services for the repair of babbitt bearings and related components. Components to be repaired are shipped via common carrier to one of our repair facilities for refurbishment. PME has not established "nexus" with the State of California or City and County of San Francisco, as the Company does not have a base of operations within California, any real or tangible personal property sitused within the State (including inventory or leased property) and does not have employees or independent contractors performing services within any of these jurisdictions. In this regard, PME would be able to timely comply with the San Francisco Business Tax Declaration, as well as provide insurance certificates and policy endorsements meeting the terms of the contract.

Additionally, PME's employment policies and practices would fully comply with the general non-discrimination requirements of the Human Rights Commission. However, after a review of the Company's employee benefit programs, we have found that the insurance carrier's available coverage and PME's benefit plans as they stand today, will not meet the requirements of San Francisco's Administrative Code Chapter 12B, unless one of the exceptions are met, or the employee benefits requirements are otherwise waived. Opposition to Appointment of Jonathan Pearlman (Seat 2) to HPC

Dear Supervisors:

I am writing to <u>oppose</u> Jonathan Pearlman's nomination for Seat No. 2 on the Historic Preservation Commission (HPC). I encountered Mr. Pearlman as the developer's preservation architect on the Harding Theater project. I have been active since December 2004 in advocating the historic significance of the Harding.

Mr. Pearlman has displayed a deep-seated bias against initiatives by the preservation community and a pronounced bias in favor of developers seeking to avoid complying with the historic preservation laws. His bias runs contrary to Proposition J's requirement that members of the HPC be "qualified by reason of interest, competence, knowledge, training and experience in the historic, architectural, aesthetic, and cultural traditions of the City, interested in the preservation of its historic structures, sites and areas, and residents of the City."

Mr. Pearlman's bias is evident from his record on the Harding. In a September 2, 2008 letter to the Planning Department regarding the Harding, Mr. Pearlman wrote "The Harding has been vacant for four years now due to the objections of a few project opponents.... The community is robbed of years of positive development because of obstructionist tactics."

The facts regarding these "obstructionist tactics" by a "few project opponents" are as follows:

In December 2004, the owner of the Harding obtained Planning Commission approval to demolish the entire theater, arguing that the building has no historic significance. Mr. Pearlman supported the developer's position with a report stating "much of [the theater's] character has been stripped away.... While it has integrity

..., the original marquee, storefronts, the ticket booth and much of the façade ornament have been removed leaving little or no character-defining features. Although much of the interior remains intact, it is a rather ordinary example of theater design of its day...."

The preservation community, including SF Heritage, San Francisco Neighborhood Theater Foundation, Friends of 1800, and Victorian Alliance, rallied before the Board of Supervisors to advocate the historical significance of the Harding.

In April 2005, the Planning Department refused to defend the Negative Declaration before the Board of Supervisors. The demolition approvals were accordingly set aside.

Despite Mr. Pearlman's vigorous advocacy that the Harding is not historically significant, in October 2006, the Planning Department found that the Harding Theater is eligible for listing on the California Register of Historical Resources. The author of the report, Moses Corrette, agreed with the opponents' architectural historians, Christopher VerPlanck, Katherine Petrin, and Gary Lee Parks, that the Harding is exceptional for its integrity as a 1920s theater. According to Mr. Parks, who made an in-depth study, the Harding is the most intact remaining example of the renowned Reid Brothers' theaters in San Francisco.

Without the opponents' "obstructionist tactics", the developer, with Mr. Pearlman's assistance, would have succeeded in demolishing a certified historic building without environmental review.

During 2006-08, Mr. Pearlman continued to provide consulting services to the developer to fashion a plan that would allow a Negative Declaration for the Harding condominium/retail conversion project. The eventual plan was to demolish the Harding stage house to build condominiums, remove all seats, and level the theater floor to create commercial space.

On November 13, 2008, the Negative Declaration for this plan came before the Planning Commission. Mr. Pearlman wrote a lengthy letter and testified that, despite demolition of the Harding stage house, demolition and flattening of the original raked auditorium floor, installation of bathrooms in the auditorium proper, and elimination of historic access to the mezzanine and balcony, the project would not adversely affect the historic character of the theater.

Over thirty people came to the afternoon Planning Commission hearing to testify in favor of preserving theater and other community uses of the Harding, including Western Addition residents, numerous members of the theater community, preservationists, members of the African-American community, and at least one merchant. Only about five people testified in favor of the project.

A central issue was whether the Harding stage and scenery fly contribute to the historic character of the theater. Notably, in his 2005 report, Mr. Pearlman had reported that "the back of the [Harding stage] house area looks like it may have been designed for legitimate or vaudeville theater due to the depth of the stage area, its tall fly loft and what appears to be gridwork anchoring for rigging.... There are stairs that go to a basement area under the stage on each side which may have included dressing rooms and a green room for orchestra members. There are no permits or drawings that show an addition of stage of fly loft area suggesting that they are probably original and added during construction in 1926."

In a dramatic reversal, Mr. Pearlman claimed in his September 2, 2008 letter to the Planning Department that the Harding stage had never been intended or used for vaudeville. He noted the demise of vaudeville with the advent of talkies at the end of the 1920s, adding that "The theaters that were used for vaudeville were built decades before the Harding and it is highly unlikely that Samuel Levin [who built the Harding] ... would have invested his time or money into the dying theater style."

Opponents provided the Planning Commission newspaper movie listings from 1926-1928 (attached), showing that Mr. Levin had prominently advertised the Harding as a vaudeville venue. Further, contrary to Mr. Pearlman's assertion that by 1926, vaudeville theaters were no longer being built, opponents showed that as late as 1929 the Reid Brothers had included a vaudeville stage in their National Register Redwood City Fox Theater, and that the 1926 San Francisco Orpheum Theater was built with a vaudeville stage.

At the Planning Commission Mr. Pearlman nevertheless persisted in the claim that the Harding stage had never been intended or used for vaudeville performances. Indeed, even after the Planning Commission hearing, on December 19, 2008, Mr. Pearlman wrote to the Chronicle, gratuitously and again falsely claiming that 'The theater was built for movies, not vaudeville."

The Planning Commission voted unanimously 7-0 to reject Mr. Pearlman's claims and require an EIR.

Therefore, the opponents, whose testimony overwhelmed the handful of supporters, vindicated historic preservation laws by forcing the legally required environmental review of the demolition of the Harding's stage house and the radical transformation of the theater into commercial space.

In summary, Mr. Pearlman has publicly branded our successful efforts to defend the Harding against violations of the preservation laws as "obstructionist" and "robbing" San Francisco of "positive" development. As he said in his September 2, 2008 letter, he sees compliance with these laws as a nuisance and impediment to development, and believes we should trust developers "to save our architectural heritage as they are the only ones who have the will and the means to undertake the complex and difficult projects."

We should not entrust the voters' mandate in creating the Historic Preservation Commission to a person who reflexively views people who vindicate preservation laws as unjustly standing in the way of development, and who will go to great lengths to ignore the evidence before him to clear the way for destroying or critically compromising historic buildings.

As a recent graduate of the San Francisco Fire Department's Neighborhood Emergency Response Team program, I am writing to express my appreciation for all the City of San Francisco does to make NERT viable and accessible to every citizen.

The two-day intensive training I completed has better prepared me for a variety of disasters, and if nothing else, I am prepared to take care of myself. This program is invaluable given our impending earthquake, and the San Francisco Fire Department has done a tremendous job in developing and executing the NERT mission – preparing us "To Do the Most Good for the Most People."

I was greatly impressed by the breadth of the NERT program. The hands-on training, including turning off gas/electricity/water, putting out fires, and practicing basic disaster medicine, takes the course curriculum to a new level. I left feeling calmer and better prepared for a major disaster, and have more reassurance that I will be able to provide authentic help in any unexpected and critical situation. If you've not taken the class yourself, I highly recommend doing so.

The State and City's budget issues are of course very real, but a program such as NERT will save lives directly. I strongly support continuing to make available funds — or not access funds already in place — that keep NERT functioning and growing. The true value of this program cannot be assessed unfortunately until after a disaster, but based on the education I received and my new base of knowledge, multiplied out by the over 16,000 civilians that have participated, the SFFD's time and dollars will both be well-spent.





On a 15th Century parchment manuscript titled Codex Atlanticus, Leonardo DaVinci first conceptualized an aircraft lifted and sustained in the air by rotating blades turning on vertical axes. DaVinci modeled the aerodynamics of the rotary wing in 1483 by experimenting with large rulers..."whirling most rapidly through the air so that you will find your arm borne in the same direction along the same axis as the plane of the ruler."

From the Greek word helix or spiral and the Latin word pteron or wing, the achievement of rotary wing powered flight emerged 500 years later. The first helicopters were built in northern France in 1907. The first emergency flight of a US helicopter took place on January 3, 1944 when blood plasma was rushed by a Coast Guard R-4 to a badly burned crew aboard a US Navy ship near New York harbor.

In 1956 Bell Helicopter Textron won the contract to build a prototype helicopter for the U.S. Army. The Bell UH-1 Iroquois or Huey aircraft remains the most popular aircraft in the Western hemisphere and the prototype air ambulance. A battlefield helicopter used for riverine patrol during the Vietnam war, the Huey gained iconic stature in its application to the humanitarian mission of air evacuation of the war wounded and disaster response.

The Huey accommodates a pilot, six stretchers and an attendant. It's maximum take off weight is 9,500 pounds. The colossal threshing power of its 48 foot main rotor generates a maximum cruising speed of 127 mph.

The properties of vertical lift and hover and the ability to land on lawns, streets, parking lots, hospital rooftops...or not to land at all! To hover while hoisting an injured disaster victim upward using a cable and basket, make helicopters adaptable to the mission of land and sea search and rescue and hospital based aeromedical transport. Conventional rotorcraft cannot fly safely in dense fog, at low altitudes, over varying or unfamiliar terrain, in icing conditions, in high winds or severe turbulence. With few exceptions, there may not be direct access for helicopters in residential or high rise areas that do not have provisions for helicopter landing.

Where civil helicopters differ from army and navy models is that, in general, they have to make a profit for their operators carrying people and cargo. Helicopters are less efficient than airplanes. They need more power to carry a given payload. They burn more fuel and fly more slowly. Early helicopters were inefficient and uneconomic because they carried fewer passengers.

The Aeromedical Mission

According to the Association of Air Medical Services, an industry group in Washington, D.C., the U.S. fleet of emergency medical helicopters has climbed from roughly 400 in 2002 to more than 800 in 2008. These helicopters carry up to 400,000 patients a year.

According to USA Today research the average number of EMS helicopter crashes climbed even faster, from about five per year during the early and mid 1990's to more than 15 per year since 2000 - a 200% increase.

Transportation of critically ill and severely injured patients by air is becoming an increasingly common practice due to factors such as prolonged ground transit times, improvements in survival of

In the state of California an aging population consolidation derives the need for rapid interfacility transport of the acutely ill or injured patient.

Hospital based aeromedical transport programs were born out of the Korean and Vietnam war experience. In the 1960's emergency physicians and trauma surgeons began organizing regionalized trauma care systems in the United States patterned after military field (MASH) units that incorporated the lifesaving benefits of airlifting the wounded to well equipped and expertly staffed surgical hospitals.

The first U.S. hospital based aeromedical transport program began in Denver, Colorado in 1972. The number of programs tripled from 1981-1986. Over 200 aeromedical transport programs now operate within the United States. In Germany and Switzerland, aeromedical transport offers expanded search and rescue capabilities and air ambulances and flight crew operate in the first responder capacity.

Aeromedical missions can be classifed as primary or secondary responses. In a primary response the mission involves transport from the scene of an accident or injury.

The "scene call" is one of rapid response with a goal of takeoff within 6 minutes and minimum flight time. Scene calls constitute from 30 to 60% of air ambulance missions from program to program.

A secondary response is activated following a request from an institution that does not offer tertiary care services. Secondary response missions have inherently longer response times. A long distance response may be 150 to 500 miles. Interfacility transports involve the transfer of patients from emergency room to emergency room or from emergency room to burn units, critical care units, operating rooms, neonatal intensive care units or organ donors.

Controversy exists over the need for up to 50% of aeromedical transports. A 1996 investigation published in the prestigious Journal of Trauma evaluated the inappropriate use of helicopter transport in an urban area finding that 45% of patients were admitted to non-ICU areas of the receiving hospitals. A 1997 J Trauma investigation comparing 1350 patients transported by helicopter with 17,000 transported by ambulance found an increased survival in the helicopter group with higher ISS trauma scores. A 2002 J Trauma study of the utility of helicopter transport in an urban system found helicopters were used excessively for patients who weren't severely injured and often didn't get patients to the hospital faster than ground ambulances. In that study 33% of patients were discharged home from the emergency department, 9% underwent emergency surgery for fractures and only 2% needed life saving surgery.

Where the medical literature finds greatest consensus is in the helicopter transport of injured children. A 1996 investigation published in the Journal of Pediatric Surgery found a better survival among severely injured air transported children. A 2004 J Trauma review of 1200 traumatized children found improved survival and shorter ICU stays for children with major trauma transferred by air ambulance after hospital stabilization. This benefit is believed to stem from pediatric airway management.

The Needs and Feasibility Report of the San Francisco Department of Public Health Medical Helipad Project concludes that "This primary benefit would be realized in small annual numbers, with the transport of critically injured infants, toddlers, and young children from SFGH to a Pediatric Trauma Center. There is an overall trend toward better outcomes for children treated at Pediatric Trauma Centers compared with those treated at Adult Trauma Centers."

Other tertiary care benefits of air medical transport have been seen in patients with spinal cord injuries, severe burns, limb amputations, strokes, myocardial infarctions, high risk obstetrics and neonates.

Ethical debate has stormed over the profit motive fueling inappropriate utilization of air ambulances by hospital and non-hospital based programs who receive on average \$7,500 per flight from third party payers including Medicare.

About 750 helicopters operated as air ambulances in the USA according to the Association of Air Medical Services in 2005. In 2008 the U.S. EMS helicopter fleet is estimated to include 800 aircraft.

Aeromedical helicopters are typically adapted from commercial airframes. Most are modified from general purpose aircraft. There are exceptions. The Stanford Life Flight MBB BK117

Due to the restricted size of the medical compartment, noise, vibration and lighting, a limited amount of intervention can be performed on the patient while in transit. The average passenger compartment of a medical helicopter is approximately 4 to 5 feet wide, five feet high and 5 to 7 feet in length. The size restrictions of the medical compartment mandate either rapid delivery to a specialty care center or maximum patient stabilization prior to transport.

Flight crews consist of a pilot and medical attendants with varying skills and qualifications including paramedics, flight nurses, flight surgeons and specialized transport teams for neonatal transports, high risk obstetrics and organ harvesting.

Surge in Air Ambulance Crashes

The safety of aeromedical transport has become the subject of increasing scrutiny and concern. A series of accidents in the 1980's led the National Transportation Safety Board to study air ambulances. It found that most accidents were preventable, and recommended tighter standards, better training and improved government oversight. The number of accidents dropped and remained low until the mid-1990's.

Since the year 2000 the number of air ambulances has climbed 50% from 500 to 750 according to the USA Today data base of 275 helicopter accidents since 1978. The average number of crashes climbed even faster, from about five per year during the early and mid 1990's to more than 15 per year since 2000 - a 200% increase. The newspaper's analysis found 82% of fatal crashes were caused by human error - almost all by pilots.

From 2000 to 2005, 60 people died in 84 crashes- more than double the number of crashes during the previous five years. According to the USA Today July 18, 2005 cover story Surge in Crashes Scars Air Ambulance Industry, "Since 2000, more than 10% of the U.S. air ambulance helicopter fleet has crashed. If commercial airlines lost the same proportion of large passenger jets as air ambulance companies lost helicopters, 90 airliners would crash each year."

Proponents of EMS helicopters argue that the greatest number of occupational fatalities in emergency medical services are transport related whether by helicopter or ground ambulance. A 2002 six year analysis published in Annals of Emergency Medicine found that of 114 EMS worker deaths, 75% were transport related...67 occurred during ground transport and 19 or 22% during air ambulance transport.

In 2008 a fiery collision killed six people aboard two medical helicopters that were arriving with patients at Flagstaff Medical Center. It was the ninth accident of the year involving EMS helicopters bringing the death toll to 16. According to the National Transportation Safety Board there were 13 accidents and 10 deaths involving air ambulances in 2006. There were 14 accidents and 24 deaths in 2007. From the period October 2007 through October 2008, nine crashes killed 35 people.

According to the Congressional Research Service from 2002 to 2005, 1 of every 50 medical helicopters in the U.S. fleet was involved in a crash. According to NTSB data the accident rate for EMS helicopters rose from 3.52 accidents per 100,000 flight hours between 1992 and 2001 to 4.56 accidents per 100,000 flight hours between 1997 and 2001. In all a total of 110 patients and medical professionals have been killed in 120 medical helicopter crashes since the year 2000.

In January of 2006 the five member NTSB urged the Federal Aviation Administration to take steps to improve the safety of medical helicopters. The NTSB has no power to force the FAA to adopt its recommendations but voted unanimously in October of 2008 to elevate the recommendations to its annual list of top safety priorities:

- Require EMS helicopter operators to install Terrain Awareness Systems to warn pilots when helicopters are in danger of crashing into the ground, mountains or buildings.
- Require EMS flights carrying only medical personnel to follow the more stringent safety rules applied to flights carrying patients and donor organs. Of 55 EMS helicopter crashes from 2002 to 2005, 10 involved medical personnel only.
- Require a formal flight risk evaluation before takeoff. Fifteen of the 55 crashed could have been prevented.

Called "Crew Resource Management", the training encourages pilots to listen to crewmember concerns and monitor themselves for fatigue and tension.

The National Transportation Safety Board and its investigators are concerned about the adequacy of FAA oversight of air ambulance companies. Government inspections of air ambulance operations, a process critical to holding companies accountable for safety, have been called "haphazard and inadequate."

In 2005 the number of employees the FAA classifies as inspectors fell from 3,600 to 3,400 and its budget cut by \$25 million by the Bush Administration. As a result, the air ambulance industry is accepting a higher accident ratio than other areas of the aviation industry.

An FAA task force called for several interventions to improve air ambulance safety. They include mandatory pilot training for handling poor visibility, tightening air ambulance regulations to make them more consistent with those for small airlines and adopting stricter guidelines for flying in bad weather conditions. Air ambulances programs that fly using instrument flight regulations (IFR) are inherently safer than aircraft depending solely upon pilots using visual flight rules (VFR).

Advanced instruments and avionics in the next generation of rotorcraft will improve pilot performance by reducing the high level of concentration needed to fly contemporary helicopters and by providing electromechanical control assist, navigational aids and reduced cockpit noise and vibration.

The inauguration of U.S. President Barack Obama offers hope of economic stimulus for the aviation industry where up to \$5 billion is expected to be allocated for upgrades in aviation infrastructure.

Health Effects of Noise Exposure

For over two decades community acceptance has been the overriding consideration in efforts to site a medical helipad in San Francisco. San Francisco neighborhoods have historically considered heliports to be an undesirable land use, primarily because of concerns about noise and safety.

In 1999 the Police Department leased the contaminated property adjacent to Building 606 at the Hunters Point Shipyard for their new helicopter program subject to conditions designed to protect the public from underlying soil contamination on property designated a Federal Superfund Site.

The Environmental Protection Agency was concerned that contaminated soil would be stirred up by the downwash from the main rotors. The EPA established a minimum size for a paved helicopter pad and required that landings be made at the helipad center, based on the 36 foot length of the police department's helicopter rotor. EMS helicopter rotor diameters range from 36 to 48 feet.

The police helicopter program was closed down in 2000 after a fatal accident that killed two officers.

In September 2002, commercial medical helicopters under contract with the San Francisco Department of Public Health began making approximately 5 landings per week at the unused Police heliport at the Hunters Point Shipyard. Helicopters landing at the shipyard transported patients to specialized emergency services available at Davies Medical Center for the reattachment of severed limbs or to UCSF Medical Center for high risk obstetrics, transplants and cardiac bypass surgery. The shipyard heliport became an alternative to the Seton Hospital helipad in Daly City. The transport time from both helipads to San Francisco receiving hospitals was approximately 15 minutes or more.

Due to community complaints in December 2002 and documented violations of the environmental restrictions on the helipad the use of the shipyard heliport for aeromedical transports was revoked.

In April of 2005 the Board of Supervisors City Operations committee conducted a hearing after receiving hundreds of phone calls, emails and letters complaining about news helicopters hovering over a sinkhold on Highway 101 at 5:30 am in proximity of San Francisco General Hospital. Neighbors complained that windows shook so loudly they terrified children and animals and that the noise went on for more than an hour.

An organized neighborhood opposition group - Stop The Helipad- held meetings in anticipation of the October 2006 projected release of the Environmental Review for the San Francisco General

Charles M. Salter Associates, A San Francisco acoustical engineering firm, conducted by preliminary noise analyses as part of the study. Helicopter noise contours developed by Salter indicate that under a worst-case scenario of two daytime and one nightime flights to and from the hospital, the criterion noise level of 65 dB KNL (day-night noise level) used by the FAA and CalTrans, would be confined almost entirely to the hospital campus.

The University of California at San Francisco has proposed the construction of a Women's and Children's Hospital at the Mission Bay Campus with a state of the art rooftop helipad offering a more safe arrival and departure flight path along the eastern coastline of San Francisco bay. As the greatest benefit in helicopter transport has been proven to be in the transport of severely injured children to pediatric trauma centers, this project offers the greatest utility for siting of both a hospital based helipad and state of the art aeromedical transport program.

The UCSF Mission Bay helipad is slated for completion in 2014. An environmental impact report scheduled for completion in March 2008 was delayed in order to conduct additional noise studies. A helicopter flight test was conducted on October 21, 2007 to allow residents to experience noise levels associated with the aircraft. Noise experts hired by the medical center put the expected sound level at about 80 decibels. Noise experts described this as "similar to the noise created by a garbage disposal from about 3 feet away."

The UCSF Medical Center at Mission Bay Residential Sound Reduction Program for Helicopter Operations has scheduled a public meeting on February 23, 2009 to solicit public comments on the adequacy and accuracy of information presented in the Draft Supplemental Environmental Impact Report focusing on the RSRP mitigation measure.

In a four year study published in the European Health Journal, a research team led by Lars Jarup and environmental health researcher at the University of lasgow found that people living for at least five years near an airport or under a flight path have a greater risk of developing high blood pressure than those who live in quieter areas. High blood pressure can lead to stroke, heart attack, heart failure and kidney failure.

Jarup concluded that living near airports where you have exposure to nighttime aircraft noise is a major issue. The study of nearly 5,000 people found that an increase in nightime aircraft noise of 10 decibels increased the risk of high blood pressure by 14 percent in both men and women. The researchers remotely measured the blood pressure of 140 volunteers every 15 minutes while they slept in their homes near London's Healthrow airport. Using digital recorders to determine what noises had the biggest impact on blood pressure ranging from snoring, to road traffic and aircraft takeoffs and landings, they determined the decibel level of the sound - not it's origin had the most significant impact.

The 65 to 80 decibel sound levels generated by up to three aeromedical helicopter take off and landings at the proposed helipads at the San Francisco General Hospital and the proposed Mission Bay Hospital will exceed the noise levels found by Jarup to cause chronic hypertension in residents living under the flight path of arriving and departing EMS helicopters.

As a full time flight physician for Stanford Life Flight for two years from 1986 through 1988, I participated in 300 transports and can personally attest to the sleep and emotional disturbance generated by having flight crew sleep quarters immediately adjacent to a medical helipad.

Transport of the Spine Injured Patient

From 1975 to 1984, acutely injured spinal cord patients within 150 miles of the Regional Spinal Cord Injury Unit at the Santa Clara Valley Medical Center were evacuated by M.A.S.T., (Military Assistance to Safety and Traffic) of the Department of the Army 237th Medical Detachment stationed at Fort Ord, California.

In May 1984, Stanford Life Flight came into being providing helicopter service throughout the catchment area for the spinal unit. The superb service offered helicopter activation on a five minute call basis with it's main response being trauma scene calls and interfacility transports.

I participated in approximately 300 transports during a two year fellowship, served as a "junior" a attending physician in the emergency department at Stanford University Hospital and as teaching faculty with the Stanford Life Support Training Center. In March of 1988 I became a Research Associate to Dr. Sabelman at the Palo Alto Veteran's Administration RR&D furthering our investigations into cervical spine trauma and the biomechanical analysis of falls in the elderly.

Interfacility transport introduces significant risks of exacerbation of injury to the patient with spinal injury. Several methods have been developed to minimize this risk. Although tape, sandbags and backboard is seen as an effective means of immobilization in the prehospital setting, once identified, cervical spine injury is best approached with a technique that ensures both rigid immobilization and quantifiable traction. Traction maintains the cervical spine in a neutral axis to overcome the "telescoping" effect that spasm of cervical muscles has on unstable spine elements and the damaged cord. It also prevents attendants from inadvertent manipulation beyond the neutral range.

Early studies, including the experience of the Flying Squads and Paraplegic unit of Dublin, Ireland demonstrated a reduction in induced injury attributed to better management during transport. In 1978 Connolly and Mains of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration evaluated the performance of standard cervical traction devices used in transport. The application of traction during ambulance or helicopter transport had been traditionally undertaken by one of two methods. The first employed tongs as skull calipers with traction generated by a cable. The second method utilized a "bungee cord" - a cord with one or more knots - as the source of traction and a small in-line spring scale to indicate the amount of force applied.

The results of the NASA investigation determined hanging weights to be detrimental in the high vibration environment of the ambulance or helicopter. The weights were found to swing constantly during transport with variation of applied traction over a range of 15 pounds. With severe road conditions the applied force nearly doubled. The recommendation of the NASA engineers was to promote the development of a constant force spring assembly to minimize the variation in traction forces generated during air or ground ambulance transport.

Testing at the Santa Clara Valley Medical Center yielded three prototypes of a constant force backboard traction system. The third became the method of choice for the interfacility transport of adult patients with acute cervical spine injury. The device allowed adjustable traction to be applied via Gardner Wells tongs. The series of all acute, cervical spine injured adults transported by the aeromedical service to the regional spinal service was reviewed. In three years 59 patients were transported with cervical spine injury using the backboard traction device. In no case was there documented deterioration in neurological function.

The San Francisco Medical Helipad Project

The San Francisco Health Commission approved the City and County of San Francisco Trauma Care System Plan in August of 2001 and requested that SFGH conduct a needs assessment and feasibility analysis for a medical helipad at the San Francisco General Hospital. The Trauma Care System Plan revealed vulnerabilities in San Francisco's ability to prevent death and disability from injury. The trauma system vulnerabilities -geographic isolation, traffic congestion and population density- are especially aggravated by the lack of air medical access to San Francisco's only Trauma center. This can be particularly problematic when injuries are sustained by children requiring specialized care and transfer to Oakland's Children's Pediatric Trauma Center.

In September 2002, the San Francisco Health Commission approved an agreement with the San Francisco architectural firm of Gerson/Overstreet to provide analytical, planning and architectural services for the San Francisco General Air Medical Access Needs and Feasibility Study. On March 4, 2003 the Air Access Needs and Feasibility Study was presented to the Health Commission. The study concluded SFGH should pursue the prospect of siting a medical helipad at its main hospital campus. The study cited a decline in annual admissions volumes at SFGH and the concern that Title XXII (California Code of Regulations, Chapter 7 Trauma Care Systems) requires

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that a level 1 Trauma Center meet a minimum was retired as a few days and the standard of the standard of

density and traffic congestion surrounded on three sides by water with only one trauma center and lacking a pediatric trauma center. This benefit was seen to be most important in the setting of a natural disaster, multi-casualty incident or facility problem at SFGH including an earthquake structural collapse, power or massive equipment failure.

Secondary benefits include financial and patient volume support for the Trauma Center generated by increasing numbers of tertiary referrals and the positive impact on medical staff retention and recruitment.

The financial incentives invite controversy and ethical debate. A 2002 study in The Journal of Trauma found that helicopters were used "excessively" for patients who weren't severely injured and often didn't get the patients to the hospital any faster than ground ambulances. One explanation for the overuse was profit.

According to Bryan Bledsoe, M.D. an emergency physician and University of Nevada researcher of medical helicopter accidents, only a small subset of patients benefit from aeromedical transport including those who need a cardiac stent or balloon wihtin a 90 minute window. Bledsoe said 2 out of 3 patients transported by EMS helicopter generally have minor inuiries and 1 in 4 is sent home without being admitted to the hospital.

The authors of the Executive Summary of the San Francisco General Hospital Medical Center Air Medical Access Needs and Feasibility Study deserve reprimand for efforts to minimize helicopter safety issues. Their summary states, "The study found that air medical helicopter operations are not inherently unsafe, but accidents can and do happened. Secondly, should an accident occur, the greatest danger would be to the aircrew members. There is little evidence to support any danger to surrounding neighborhoods, even though some of these neighborhoods would be subject to helicopter overflight."

The reality is that since the year 2000, 110 people have died in 120 air ambulance crashes and the dead include an 11 day old infant and her mother, a 63 year old business executive with chest pain, and a 70 year old doctor with heart problems all occurred during aeromedical transport to tertiary care medical centers. From 2002 to 2005, 1 in about 50 medical helicopters in the U.S fleet was involved in a crash. This is a far deadlier rate than the U.S. airline industry which went nearly five years without a commercial jetliner crash earlier this decade.

More significantly, the study fails to adequately analyze the consequences of a crash in a congested urban area. The San Francisco Police Department helipad program at the Hunters Point Shipyard was shut down in 2000 after a fatal crash in which two officers were killed.

A third concern voiced by neighbors was the potential effects of helicopter operations at the hospital on residential property values.

Two additional options have been utilized for emergency landing zones for air ambulances seeking access to San Francisco hospitals. A temporary landing zone or "helispot" was used in the 1980's by Stanford LifeFlight on Pier 29. Air ambulances currently use San Francisco Airport which adds thirty minutes to the ground transit time because the helicopters much join a queue that approaches the airport from the south, even though most flights approach from the north.

In May of 2006 a 19 member Civil Grand Jury released the report Realities of Emergency and Disaster Medical Preparedness in San Francisco. The report found that a priniciple vulnerability of medical emergency preparedness is the lack of air medical access to the city's 9 functioning hospitals. Additionally it identified that, "a major unknown facing San Francisco will be the physical integrity of its hospitals after a major earthquake. For this reason San Francisco has been actively involved in a regional planning process with Marin County and San Mateo County and with a ten county plan formulated under the latest DHS grant application."

Controversies in Prehospital Care and Aeromedical Transport

On October 19, 2004 the Scientific Assembly of the American College of Emergency Physician's convened in San Francisco's Moscone Convention Center. Marc Eckstein, M.D, FACEP Associate Professor of Emergency Medicine, University of Southern California and Medical Director of the Los

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Transport.

Eckstein reviewed the literature on the wife many ost of aeromedical properties of the first and cost of aeromedical properties of the first ambulance programs. His primary focus was on safety concerns and the inherent risks in helicopter transport. He analyzed the impact of the down wash of rotors on ground personnel, weather and urban obstacles and cited a study appearing in Annals of Emergency Medicine 40:2002 Occupational Fatalities in EMS which documents that in a 6 year analysis of 114 fatalities 75% were transport related and 22% involved

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Angeles Fire Department presented an under the state of the st

air ambulances.

The driving question of Ecksteins review was "Is the emergency aeromedical transport ofpatients justified?" He suggests that no good controlled studies have been undertaken and that comparing different flight programs is like comparing "apples and oranges" because staffing differences in flight crews (medics, RNs, MDs) introduces variations in scope of practice and capabilities.

Eckstein concludes that aeromedical transport finds its greatest utility where patients cannot be accessed via ground transport but that, in general, helicopters are overused in urban settings. An investigation examining the Utility of helicopter transport of trauma patients in an urban system- J Trauma 53:2002- looked at a 10 retrospective review of air ambulance patients finding 33% were discharged home from the emergency room and that only 2% needed life saving surgery.

Yet another study analyzed the impact of discontinuing a hospital based air ambulance program on trauma patient outcomes in Galveston, Texas. A 12% decline in trauma admissions and a 17% decline in admissions of severely injured patients was seen with no difference in mortality including hypotensive patients. The study also revealed the total transport time for patients brought by helicopter was significantly longer than for patients brought by ground.

An extensive review of literature found aeromedical transport offered its greatest life saving benefits to patients with major trauma and severe injury scores, especially pediatric patients. Trauma patients transported by helicopter received more advanced life support intervention and benefitted, in general, from faster transport times.

A statewide 7 year study in North Carolina found that patients transported by air ambulance had a lower trauma score and a higher injury severity score. An increased survival was seen in patients with a TS of 5-12 and ISS of 21 to 30. The majority of the 7% of 17,000 patients transported by air ambulance had a low ISS that would not justify helicopter transfer.

A 4 year trauma registry from Boston, MA examined 17,000 blunt trauma patients transported by air with 23,000 transported by ground and found a 24% reduction in mortality by multivariate analysis. Helicopters were staffed with medics and either RNs or MDs.

A study in Military Medicine 164:1999, however, examined aeromedical transport of trauma patients looking at 700 patients transported by ground and 100 transported by helicopter finding no difference in mortality when controlled for injury severity score.

The Air Ambulance of the Future

"The time is ripe for beginning a new effort to design and ultimately build an advanced aeromedical transport (AAT) aircraft using current technology for materials, propulsion and flight instrumentation. This effort cannot be solely the province of the traditional aircraft designer, however; the needs and new capabilities of the medical community are the driving factors underlying this proposal. Until now there has been no aircraft of domestic manufacture designed specifically to meet the requirements of patient transport." Advanced Aeromedical Transport: Synergistic Design for Optimum Medical & Aeronautical Performance Eric E. Sabelman and Ahimsa P Sumchai

The Executive Summary of the Emergency Medical Service Rotorcraft Technology Workshop (Washington, D.C. Oct. 14-14, 1981) concludes that key technological needs for the EMS helicopter of the future are:

- Ride quality of a fixed wing aircraft ie: reduced internal and external noise and vibration
- No tail rotor optimizing safety to crew and ground personnel during "hot loading"
- Small rotor diameter minimizing rotor downwash
- Improved visibility from cockpit optimizing safety in landing and departure
- Crashworthy vehicle

In the Spring of 1987 Eric Sabelman, Ph.D my principle investigator in a series of research projects published in peer review journals on cervical spine stablization during helicopter transport arranged a meeting with John Zuk, Ph.D. head of the Rotary Wing and Powered Lift Division of the NASA - Ames Research Center in Mountain View to discuss NASA's cooperation with our investigations.

Dr. Zuk accompanied Dr. Sabelman and I on a tour of the hanger at the Mountain View facility introducing us to "the air ambulance of the future" -the experimental XV-15 Civil Tiltrotor research aircraft, a helicopter airplane hybrid.

Bell Helicopter, a Textron Company, is a \$1.6 billion, leading producer of commercial and military helicopters and the pioneer of the revolutionary tiltrotor aircraft. The rotors of the tiltrotor aircraft are called nacelles. With its nacelles in the vertical position, the tiltrotor takes off, lands and hovers like a traditional helicopter. When the nacelles are tilted forward to the horizontal position, the aircraft flies with the speed and range of a turboprop fixed-wing airplane.

Working with human factors engineers from the Stanford Center for Design Research, Dr. Sabelman and I submitted a project proposal to NASA-Ames outlining a methodology to prepare computer and physical simulations demonstrating the capabilities of candidate vehicles for the synergistic engineering design and medical transport needs of an advanced air ambulance.

"A civil aeromedical transport using the technology proven by the XV-15 Tiltrotor research aircraft would have several intrinsic advantages over helicopters presently employed in this service. These advantages originate in the combination of vertical flight with the characteristics of fixed wing aircraft during forward flight. A medically configured tiltrotor design could incorporate all user tasks including first response capabilities. The design effort will concentrate on adaptation of the fuselage, including internal dimensions, crew placement, ingress and egress for both patient and crew and location of medically significant facilities. The XV-15 appears to be sized to have the minimum lift capacity and the maximum rotor area or landing footprint desireable for foreseeable aeromedical missions. "

Our proposal was greeted with much enthusiasm but was ultimately deemed "ahead of its time". Tiltrotor technology was in need of the national development of a civil aviation infrastructure. Additionally, while the XV-15 had been successfully flight tested, a larger tiltrotor model, the military V22 Osprey and the conceptual 8-10 passenger civil CTR-800 failed flight testing and for nearly 20 years was put on the "back burner" of civilian aviation technology research and development.

On July 22, 2005 at Fort Worth, Texas, the Bell/Agusta 609 tiltrotor streaked over the skies of Central Texas with its outboard nacelles rotating forward to full airplane mode for the first time. When making its first transition to airplane mode the BA609 flew at 219 mph. The BA609 is a six to nine passenger aircraft with market applications for corporate business and government customers for a variety of roles including search and rescue.

On June 14, 2006 two MV-22 Ospreys, the military's first fully operational tiltrotor aircraft, arrived at Miramar Marine Corps Air Station in San Diego to run practice exercises such as aerial refueling.

Bell/Agusta Programs Director Jack Gallagher is quoted as saying, "This is truly a momentous point in aviation history because we have finally achieved the full range of flight on the world's first civil tiltrotor. This changes everything in vertical lift and general aviation.



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Subject Editorial: Don't privatize the taxicab permits



Don't privatize cab permits

EDITORIAL In tough times, political leaders with no backbone for making hard decisions tend to look for easy, short-term fixes. And Mayor Gavin Newsom's proposal to auction off taxicab permits to the highest bidder is just that a quick fix with serious long-term problems. In fact, it amounts to the privatization of a lucrative public asset.

A bit of background: since 1978, when then-Sup. Quentin Kopp authored a measure called Proposition K, San Francisco has issued some 1,500 taxi permits, known as medallions, to working cab drivers. Under Prop. K, the medallions can't be owned by corporations, and they can't be bought and sold as speculative commodities. They're owned by the city, and only people who actually drive cabs for a living can use them.

There's a logic to that. The permits are valuable - a medallion holder not only has the right to drive a cab, he or she can lease that permit to other drivers for additional shifts. Since a taxi can be on the road 24 hours a day, the lease income is substantial, roughly \$30,000 a year. But only active drivers get that benefit; nobody can hold a permit, sit at home (or work another job), and just collect that cash.

The process isn't perfect. The waiting list for a medallion takes more than 10 years. Some medallion holders cling to their permits long after they should have retired (and thus keep driving when they should no longer be on the road). There's no process for compensating a permit holder who becomes disabled.

But those are issues that can be addressed. The basic fact is that San Francisco has taken the position that the public benefit - a license to drive a cab for hire - should be given only to those who are using it. Prop. K prevents consolidation of ownership in the industry, prevents speculators from turning medallions into a new form of securities (which worked out so well with mortgages), and gives people who have spent 10 years or more driving a cab a chance to reap the full benefits of their work.

Newsom, however, sees those permits as a gold mine. If the city auctioned them off, they might bring \$100,000 apiece. Under Newsom's plan, much of that money would go to the city, although some would go to current medallion holders.

The plan is full of problems. For one, it could completely change the cab business in San Francisco,



shifting control of the industry away from drivers and giving it to big businesses and investors. Very few working drivers (who are lucky to clear \$30,000 a year) could afford to buy permits, particularly at auction. So the first people in the market would be the cab companies, which for years have wanted the right to own and control the medallions. Private investors-wealthy individuals and institutions-would see the permits as an asset likely to appreciate, and would buy up medallions, then seek to raise the lease fees for drivers. The only way drivers could buy permits would be to seek the equivalent of mortgage loans-but the banks that handle that sort of loans typically require 20 percent down, putting many drivers out of the running. Unless, that is, some shadowy characters come along with cash loans or unless the cab companies handle that payment, thereby getting further control).

Unless medallion ownership is limited to drivers, the entire process will get corrupted. People will drive for a minimal period of time, bid on medallions, then go into another line of work - and keep the medallion. Newsom's office says he's going to do that, but there are no details on the plan yet.


Cab drivers in the city talk about the need for security and retirement income. After years of driving with a medallion, they want the right to sell it for a chunk of cash. But under the current system, drivers are - and most of them like being - independent contractors.

Freelance writers, consultants, small business owners, and many others who are self-employed are responsible for their own retirement planning. Why should cab drivers get a special deal from the city?

Privatizing the permits is just a bad idea. Newsom promised last year - in writing - that he wouldn't seek to change Prop. K. It's infuriating to see him so quickly break that promise.

The supervisors should reject this proposal.<0x00A0><cs:5>2<cs:>

Dear Mayor Newsom,

On behalf of the San Francisco Preservation Consortium (Consortium), a grassroots education and advocacy group comprised of individuals and member organizations, I thank you for reaching out to the preservation community to ensure your nominees to the new Historic Preservation Commission (Commission) meet or exceed the attached qualifications required by Proposition J which San Francisco voters overwhelmingly approved in November 2008.

The Consortium is pleased by the appointments of Alan Martinez, AIA, Historic Architect to Seat 1, Charles Edwin Chase, AIA, Architectural Historian to Seat 3, Courtney Damkroger, AICP, Preservation Professional to Seat 5 and Karl Hasz, General Contractor to Seat 6. We hope Seats 2, 4 and 7 will be filled prior to the Commission's first meeting on Wednesday, February 4, 2009.

The Consortium conducted informal interviews with several candidates whose applications you are considering nominating to the new Commission. We did not interview candidates who are known to us through their recent participation on the Landmarks Board. Per below, we highly recommend Diane Matsuda, Esq. be nominated to Seat 7 – At Large; Robert Cherny, Ph.D. be nominated to Seat 4 – Historian; and Johanna Street, AIA be nominated to Seat 2 – Historic Architect. Alternately, we recommend Lucia Bogatay, AIA be nominated to either Seat 2 or Seat 7.

Recommended for Seat 7 - At Large: Diane Matsuda, Esq. is a native San Franciscan who attended UC Hastings College of the Law and USF. She worked under State Historian Kevin Starr as program director for the California Civil Liberties Public Education Program which funded significant projects, such as the landmarking of buildings in the three remaining California Japantowns. She expresses a keen interest in collecting the oral histories of under-represented communities which she sees as the starting point in understanding the historic significance of the built environment. In her role as the executive director of the California Cultural and Historical Endowment Ms. Matsuda gained experience in evaluating historical resources under the California Environmental Quality Act. She is specially qualified by reason of her interest, competence, knowledge, training and experience in the historic, architectural, aesthetic, and cultural traditions of the City, and her interest in the preservation of its historic structures, sites and areas, and residents of the City.

Recommended for Seat 4 - Historian: Robert Cherny, Ph.D. most recently served as Vice President of the Landmarks Preservation Advisory Board (LPAB). He is a distinguished professor of history at San Francisco State University and a renowned historian who has published extensively. The focus of Mr. Cherny's work has been on local history and labor history. He received his Ph.D. in history from Columbia University and exceeds the Secretary of the Interior's Professional Qualifications Standards for history with specialized training and/or demonstrable experience in North American or Bay Area history.

Recommended for Seat 2 - Historic Architect: Johanna Street, AIA served on the most recent LPAB and is a licensed architect specializing in historic preservation. As a sole-practitioner, she works on select preservation projects and is an advocate for the maintenance of the built environment. She holds a professional degree in Architecture from Virginia Polytech and is considered an expert in materials conservation and structural systems which enables her to offer technical assistance in solving complex design problems to Certificate of Appropriateness applicants. She is exceptionally well qualified and meets the Secretary of the Interior's Professional Qualifications Standards for historic architecture.

Alternately recommended for Seat 2 or Seat 7: Lucia Bogatay, AIA is a licensed architect recognized for her redesigns of historic buildings for contemporary use. She has practiced architecture in San Francisco for 40 years. Ms. Bogatay was appointed by Mayor Diane Feinstein to the LPAB and served for four years. She has also served on the board of the Fort Point and Presidio Historical Association, is a longstanding member of San Francisco Architectural Heritage and the National Trust for Historic Preservation. Lucia received her Master of Architecture degree from Harvard Graduate School of Design and meets the Secretary of the Interior's Professional Qualifications Standards for historic architecture.

We also conducted informal interviews with H. Ruth Todd, AIA, AICP and Carolyn Kiernat, AIA. Both are principals with Page & Turnbull, Inc. and are licensed architects who meet the Secretary of the Interior's Professional Qualifications Standards for historic architecture, qualifying them for Seat 2. However, given the City Attorney's interpretation of the conflict of interest and compensated advocacy sections of the Good Government Guide, their regular duties working for Page & Turnbull, Inc.—among the largest firms in the Bay Area providing historic preservation and conservation services—would appear to conflict with performing their regular roles in contact with the City professionally while concurrently serving on local Commissions. If not an outright conflict, their ability to serve might be severely limited.

Again, we appreciate your seeking our counsel regarding your nominees to Historic Preservation Commission Seats 2, 4 and 7. We look forward to seeing the full Commission seated as soon as possible with the highly qualified persons who have already submitted their applications to you.

Excerpt from Charter Amendment Creating an Historic Preservation Commission Proposition J - November 2008

QUALIFICATIONS. In addition to the specific requirements set forth below, members of the Historic Preservation Commission shall be persons specially qualified by reason of interest, competence, knowledge, training and experience in the historic, architectural, aesthetic, and cultural traditions of the City, interested in the preservation of its historic structures, sites and areas, and residents of the City. Six of the members of the Historic Preservation Commission shall be specifically qualified in the following fields:

- 1. Seats 1 and 2: licensed architects meeting the Secretary of the Interior's Professional Qualifications Standards for historic architecture;
- 2. Seat 3: an architectural historian meeting the Secretary of the Interior's Professional Qualifications Standards for architectural history with specialized training and/or demonstrable experience in North American or Bay Area architectural history;
- Seat 4: an historian meeting the Secretary of the Interior's Professional Qualifications Standards for history with specialized training and/or demonstrable experience in North American or Bay Area history;
- 4. Seat 5: an historic preservation professional or professional in a field such as law, land use, community planning or urban design with specialized training and/or demonstrable experience in historic preservation or historic preservation planning.
- 5. Seat 6 shall be specially qualified in one of the following fields or in one of the fields set forth for Seats 1, 2, or 3:
 - a. A professional archeologist meeting the Secretary of the Interior's Professional Qualification Standards for Archeology;
 - b. A real estate professional or contractor who has demonstrated a special interest, competence, experience, and knowledge in historic preservation;
 - c. A licensed structural engineer with at least four years of experience in seismic and structural engineering principals applied to historic structures; or
 - d. A person with training and professional experience with materials conservation.
- 6. Seat 7 shall be an at large seat subject to the minimum qualifications set forth above.

The Consortium seeks to strengthen the City's Landmarks Ordinance (Article 10 of the Planning Code), including augmenting the powers of the Historic Preservation Commission, and renewing the commitment to uphold the provisions, procedures and protections for historic downtown resources required by Article 11.

The Consortium advocates the appointment of appropriately qualified persons to the Planning Commission, the Board of Appeals and the Historic Preservation Commission. SFPUC lacks Accountability and Transparency when it comes to process - \$26 million stake.

The GHOST of Susan Leal still lingers at San Francisco Public Utilities Commission (SFPUC) - and process and how business was done in the past - has now come to haunt the SFPUC. Hunters Point Shipyard Restoration Advisory Board boots off Amy Brownell from SFHD. by Francisco Da Costa Friday Jan 23rd, 2009 7:54 AM



Amy Brownell who has been sitting on the Hunters Point Shipyard - Restoration Advisory Board (RAB) for years - has never, ever - represented the community. She has represented the interests of corrupt politicians and those that worship Greed. Yesterday, January 22, 2009 at 1800 Oakdale at the Southeast Commission Facility - Amy Brownell was booted off by the majority of the Restoration Advisory Board members - for not doing her duty and failing to represent the community. Six new RAB members joined the Board yesterday - and judging from the business at hand - they all seemed to take their responsibilities to the community - very seriously.

The Restoration Advisory Board are Boards formed to represent the community and are mostly attached to former Department of Defense (DoD) bases - that are close to large community and were closed - due to the Base-Closure Act or in the case of Hunters Point Naval Shipyard deactivated 30 years ago.

Some years ago the City and County of San Francisco with the help of the San Francisco Redevelopment Agency and its then Director Marcia Rosen - saw that Amy Brownell who works for the San Francisco Health Department, Micheal Cohen who took care of Base Closure issues, Arc Ecoloy who is a proxy for the dubious entities its represent funded by the SF Redevelopment Agency - that gives it millions of dollars - all worked against the community at large and favored the development and lack of clean-up - of the Hunters Point Naval Shipyard without a meaningful dialog.

In the past you had members like Karen Pierce, Jessie Mason, Olin Webb - some artists that lived and worked on the Shipyard - attend the RAB meetings to have their fifteen minutes of fame - and really fail to represent the interests of the community.

As I said that are Restoration Advisory Boards are found all over the Nation and many in California. The Presidio of San Francisco has one, Fort Ord has one, Alameda has one - and all of them try to genuinely represent the community.

In the case of the Hunters Point Naval Shipyard - some disgruntled members with vested interests are prodded by San Francisco City Agencies to created discord.

At one time even Community Based Organizations like Young Community Developers were used to

attend the meetings and intimidate others that meant well.

It is age old - divide and rule method that will fail each and every time - after it reaches saturation point. There are some Blacks who suffer from a Superiority Complex - they think they know too much - never do their home work and are are detriment to themselves and of course the community.

In the case of Hunters Point Naval Shipyard - the Blacks have been on the fore-front of ruining the Restoration Advisory Board. Often introducing topics that are NOT on the Agenda - using filthy language and creating discord.

As you can see the URL is so long and meant to create confusion and keep people - from being informed.

The Hunters Point Naval Shipyard is a Superfund Site and bereft with problems. It was the place that first used Depleted Uranium. If one reads the Final Radiological Assessment Report linked to the Hunters Point Naval Shipyard - one can learn a lot and understand fully the complex issues.

The copy is available at the San Francisco Main Library and is a must read for those that really want to delve and understand the issues at hand.

The Navy has expanded millions of dollars. First there was a company called International Technologies (IT) - they wasted \$300 million and declared bankruptcy.

Now. Tetra Tech is making millions - pretend to help the community and doing the opposite. Tetra Tech has connection in Washington DC and helps the campaign coffer of Nancy Pelosi and Diane Feinstein.

The RAB does not talk much about pertinent topis - and what is more knows less about the history of the past clean up. In fact the present RAB members - lack the qualification to fully comprehend - less act in a meaningful manner - to persuade the United States Navy to do the clean up. Technical issues are important to comprehend and those that lack this knowledge are at a loss to contribute to the community at large.

In the past there have been a couple of Blacks that purport to be experts - some of them insists on being called Doctors - I have never, ever seen such pathetic fools in my life. If you are a Doctor - you really do not have to insist that the world calls you a Doctor. But, at the RAB meeting you will encounter such fools - that talk and talk in circles and never, ever - get to the point.

It is in the midst of such machinations - recently - some community members have joined the Restoration Advisory Community - and yesterday six of them were brought on board to infuse new blood and some badly need fresh air - to a very polluted situation.

Keith Forman the Navy RAB Co-Chair has been working with the Community RAB Co-Chair - to help the community. But, we who have been attending the meetings and getting feed back from the pertinent sources - have found that folks like Arc Ecology, Young Community Developers, and Amy Brownell who works for the San Francisco Health Department have been compromising the community - behind the scenes.

These dubious entities do so by working against the community. These dubious entities take upon themselves to represent the community - install dust and Asbestos monitors and do not reveal the truth to the community at large.

Take money for outreach and do none of it. Foremost Arc Ecology that gets millions and it Director Saul Blook aka David Saleman - says he represents the community but does not do so and has been told so.

Recently we have had ASBESTOS exceedances way behond the 16,000 structures per cubic meter. Fifteen and even twenty times the exceedances that adversely impact the community. The problem comes from Parcel A but these crooks always blame the U.S. Navy for the problem.

In fact the dust originates from Parcel A that come under the jurisdiction of the SF Redevelopment Agency - with Arc Ecology, Young Community Developers, and Amy Brownell who works for the Health Department - not doing their job. Not doing any outreach and what is more never speaking the truth.

Parcels B, C, D, E, F all belong to the Navy - and the Navy tries to maintain some standards.

However since the year 2004 - Lennar a Rogue Developer that has closely worked with Arc Ecology, Young Community Developers, and Amy Brownwell has created Dust and Asbestos problems - and tried to blame the United States Navy.

In the past the United States Navy has come to the table and refuted the LIE. Arc Ecology, Young Community Developers, and San Francisco Health Department and Amy Brownell point fingers to the United States Navy for no reason at all.

Yesterday - Amy Brownell was booted off the Hunters Point Shipyard - Restoration Advisory Board and right so.

Now, it remains to boot off any polluted residue from Arc Ecology that does not serve the community and is there to make money - off the community.

Young Community Developers (who past Director is Missing in Action) linked to some fiscal issues and of course Amy Brownell who has LIED in the past and continue to play a dubious role - adversely affecting the community - need to be checked.

Yesterday, the Restoration Advisory Board took some major steps that hopefully will bring a drastic change and send a strong message to the Regulatory Agencies and dubious Community Based Organizations - they are :

- 1. The Environmental Protection Agency.
- 2. The Regional Water Board
- 3. The Department of Toxic and Substances Control
- 4. The San Francisco Health Department
- 5. Young Community Developers
- 6. Arc Ecology

The Restoration Advisory Board demanded the resignation of Amy Brownell and that was very good. Good riddance of very bad rubbish.

The Restoration Advisory Board to the Hunters Point Shipyard demanded that the Grand Jury investigate the machinations and ploys linked to the Regulatory Agencies and foremost the SF Health Department. A vote was taken and passed in the majority.

The Restoration Advisory Board to the Hunters Point Shipyard voted and demanded the Immediate Stoppage of all work at the Hunters Point Naval Shipyard. This too was passed by a majority vote.

More of radiological elements - from land under the jurisdiction of the United States Navy to the City and County of San Francisco. To the San Francisco Redevelopment Agency - to Lennar to build over 10,500 on the toxic dump - more a Superfund Site.

The Restoration Advisory Board deals only with the Navy and the issues it is connected with.

For the longest time ever - Arc Ecology, Young Community Developers, Bayview Hunters Point Advocates, some Artists have worked against the community - and tried to work deals with the SF Redevelopment Agency to garner favors.

It is strange that under some Agreement - the SF Redevelopment still leases out and controls some buildings on the Shipyard. All this was brought about by Congressperson Nancy Pelosi.

For example Good Will is all over the toxic Shipyard with its truck and surrounded by pollution. Having no clue about the exceedances and its drivers and others put in harm way.

The same with the San Francisco Police Department - the Laboratory and its Tactical Units - exposed to radiological and other adverse elements - in and around Building 606 - on Hunters Point Naval Shipyard. Few know about this fact in San Francisco.

There are Storage Facilities - a couple of them that the SF Redevelopment Agency collects rent and these entities have no clue they are targets of pollution.

Then the Artists chose to live and work for years on the Shipyard in Building 101 and the surrounding areas. Some died of Cancer.

The Restoration Advisory Board Members are not cognizant of these facts because many of them are not

And so everybody is talking collapse of this or that major investment house, and how we should bail out this or that bank etc. I live in a HUD SRO Low Income Housing community in San Francisco's Tenderloin District Six Area. And I am wondering if I am going to be the next generation of homeless people in San Francisco again. When I say again, I lived in Golden Gate Park for twenty years, that right, as a homeless person. But now I am a senior citizen with medical disabilities, and living on the streets would be a real disaster for me. The building I live in is 95 percent senior citizens over the age of 55 years of age, and medical disability of one kind or another. I am concerned about the future of HUD SRO in the Tenderloin Area of San Francisco in California, and of course do I have to pack up my tent and start another homeless life living in Golden Gate Park. Certainly since we are addressing financial collapses we had better start talking about making HUD SRO People another whole new generation of homeless people to be added to the existing generation of homeless people due to foreclosure of homes in the United States. Or maybe we Americans ought to pretend that financial situation away like we did when we where living on credit entirely to much, not expecting the credit bubble to bust one day or other.

I mean the free enterprise system might have been free when countries other then the United States where third world countries struggling to be like Americans, and the Americans could make really wholesales deals on buying these countries natural commodities, but now these

countries have not only caught on to the American hustle in finances, but the interpretation on the bidding for natural commodities have become a sustainable ecology question in realistic terms of market values and investment — which will definitely put the old school of economics in America out of business and re-interpret capitalism or abolish capitalism altogether.

Ms. Day,

I am writing to ask that you take the action to immediately remove the San Francisco Department of Building Inspection policy titled "Dimensional Tolerances for New and Existing Construction".

Although the Department's policy may not be as extreme in its interpretations as the "Reasonable Construction Tolerances for Disable Access Construction" policy created by the Orange Empire Chapter of ICC policy (see attached), it is my opinion that many of the assumptions within your Department's policy are similarly problematic in that I believe they directly conflict with California Building Code, Title 24 and its intent, to assure accessibility within the built environment. In 2002, the Attorney General informed the Orange Empire Chapter that their policy was in conflict with California Building Code and regulations (see attached letter). In your Department's tolerance policy, the items listed as "t" through "bb" clearly state that there are no "reference" available to support such tolerances yet the policy supports their use.

During my tenure with the City of San Francisco, when this policy was being discussed at a number of public meetings held by Building Department staff, I clearly stated my opinion, the same opinion that I have today. It is my opinion that the Department of Building Inspection's Construction Tolerance

policy is an "underground regulation" and illegal. I felt then as now, that this policy is in violation of state building code and state regulations protecting the rights of persons with disabilities.

Additionally, I am very concerned that the policy was updated by your staff in January, 2008. Was the process used to update the policy carried out in a public forum with input sought from the disability community including the Mayor's Office on Disability and the Mayor's Disability Council? Was the policy and its most recent update reviewed and agreed to by the California Department of Justice, the State Architect's Office and/or the California Building Standards Commission?

I look forward to your timely response.

Subject Part 1: President Obama Freezes Salaries of Staff Earning Over \$100,000; San Francisco's Mayor and Board of Supervisors Keep Spending Like Drunken Sailors on \$100+K Jobs

Dear Mayor Newsom and President Chiu,

I'll send you supporting background files of my various secondary analyses over the next few days, in Parts 2 and more to this initial e-mail.

Meanwhile tonight, let me say this:

The /San Francisco Chronicle /reported on January 24 that tech-savvy President Obama froze salaries of White House employees who earn more than \$100,000 annually.

If it is good enough for Washington, what is San Francisco's, or your, problem with \$100,000-plus salaries in San Francisco government? If President Obama can order a federal freeze, what's the problem with a freeze in San Francisco? This can't be global warming, can it be?

The following is based on data received from the City Controller in January 2008 and January 2009 for the preceding two calendar years.

- · Across the two calendar years (2007 v. 2008), the City increased the number of employees earning between \$100,000 and \$149,999 by 356 employees, from 6,864 to 7,220 such employees. The pay differential for them increased by \$50 million (from \$811,881,026 to \$861,917,421) in "Total Pay." [Note: Total Pay is defined as "Regular Pay," plus "Overtime Pay," plus "Other Pay."]
- · Across the two calendar years, the City increased the number of employees earning between \$150,000 and \$199,999 by 318 employees, from 1,211 to 1,529 such employees. The pay differential for them increased by \$53.5 million (from \$203,093,983 to \$256,577,276) in "Total Pay."
- · Across the two calendar years, the City increased the number of employees earning over \$200,000 by 79 employees, from 105 to 184 such



employees. The pay differential for them increased by \$17.8 million (from \$23,745,386 to \$41,624,963) in "Total Pay."

• Combined, the three categories above show that across the two calendar years, the City increased the number of employees earning over \$100,000 by 753 employees, from 8,180 to 8,933 such employees. Combined, the pay differential for them increased by \$121,399,265 million (from \$1.038 BILLION to \$1.16 BILLION) in "Total Pay."

As if that weren't enough (since the data above ended as of 12/12/08):

- The City actually handed out what I estimate at \$49.76 million in raises on December 27 (above and beyond the data above) to just 13,677 select union employees, most notably to employees represented by the Municipal Executives Association, Police Officers Association, Firefighters Association, and the Deputy Sheriff's Association).
- Another 19,978 employees at the lower end of the City's pay structure are also scheduled to receive \$49.1 million in raises on April 4, 2009, which the City is actively trying not to pay out and take away from them.
- On July 1, 2009, the City intends to award another \$18.57 million in raises to police officers, firefighters, and to the Fire and Police Chiefs, to just 4,590 such employees.
- Also scheduled throughout the remainder of FY 09-10, the City is contracted to award another \$46.7 million raises to just 7,730 employees represented by SEIU's Staff and Per Diem Nurses, the Teamsters Local 856 Supervising Nursings, and to Firefighters and Police Officers.
- All told, this is \$164.2 million in "annualized" raises, not the \$113.2 million the City reported to Supervisor McGoldrick contained in Board of Supervisors background file #081437 attached to Agenda Item 8 of the Board's Budget and Finance Committee December 17, 2008 agenda.
- The \$164.2 million in "annualized" raises for CY 2009 is above and beyond the increases noted between calendar years 2007 and 2008 outlined above.

Many of the 14,000 (of 20,000 employees due raises in April 2009) represented by SEIU earn less than \$60,000 annually. Their \$29 million in contractual raises pales in comparison to the \$164 million white elephant in the room, most of which appears to enrich management.

But given that you are tech-savvy, might you considering putting the brakes on the other \$115.million in raises? President Obama did it, why can't you?

Subject San Francisco's Board of Supervisors Are NOT -- Repeat NOT -- Holding a State-Required Bielenson Hearing on 1/27 Regarding the Mayor's Mid-Year Budget Cuts

Hi Michael,

I am very disturbed to see in the e-mail notice regarding the Gray Panther's potential action on Feb 18 a reference to Tuesday's full Board of Supervisors meeting on January 27 being misconstrued as a formal Bielenson Hearing.

This appears to be completely untrue. A "fake" - and completely illegal -- Bielenson hearing on the Mayor's mid-year budget cuts to Public Health was heard recently by the SF Health Commission.

As well all know, the Board of Supe's is NOT permitted under Health and Safety Code 1442.5 to delegate Bielenson Hearings to the Health Commission, but the Board did so illegally, acting on year-old **oral** advice from the City Attorney Office to a staffer in former Supervisor Aaron Peskin's office.

If Tuesday's Board of Supe's meeting is actually holding a Bielenson hearing, then they are again doing so illegally, first because there has been no Bielenson Hearing notices posted at entrances to Department of



Public Health facilities that the Board is holding a "second" Bielenson hearing, and second, because the Board itself has not, to my knowledge, published its own Bielenson hearing notice.

Agenda Item #30 on the Board's January 27 agenda (http://www.sfgov.org/site/bdsupvrs_page.asp?id=97197) -- and its associated background file#090049 -- do not describe this agenda item as a Bielenson Hearing.

Indeed, background file 090013 to Agenda Item #27 amending the Annual Appropriation Ordinance introduced by Supervisor Daly states on page 5 that it is holding a hearing to accept all \$37.4 million in mid-year cuts by de-appropriating (de-funding) the \$37.4 million the Mayor wants cut from DPH's current year budget.

Please clarify whether the Bielenson hearing reference in the Gray Panther's e-mail alert is accurate, or inaccurate.

After all, we should not be providing any kind of "cover" to the Board of Supe's for their collective failure to actually hold a Bielenson hearing on mid-year cuts. They've failed to perform their mandatory ministerial duties, and they should not be given cover for having failed to perform their official duties as prescribed in law.

San Francisco's proposal to curtail free speech, and eviscerate First Amendment rights, during the proposed June 2 special election in San Francisco is completely shocking.

I'm sure you have heard that one of President Barrack Obama's first official acts, via one of his first Executive Orders, was to increase access to government records by expanding the federal Freedom of Information Act, in order to create greater transparency and government accountability.

So why is it that as our new Board of Supervisors president, you are considering condoning curtailment of First Amendment, free-speech rights in San Francisco?

I assume someone on your staff — or perhaps Board-President-in-Absentia Aaron Peskin, using his Ex-Officio puppet-master role in charge of the Triple-D-C — has briefed you regarding how language proposed for the special election will strip San Franciscans of their First Amendment rights. Right?

I'm speaking, of course, about the enclosed PDF file that contains language to be approved on Tuesday, January 27, during the full Board of Supe's meeting (see agenda Item #24 at http://www.sfgov.org/site/bdsupvrs_page.asp?id=97197), for the proposed June 2, 2009 special election to identify possible new sources of revenue for the City that will be put before the voters.

Section 3f in the attached PDF file, if I'm reading this right, proposes to eliminate from the voter guide [in the "Elimination of Paid Arguments" paragraph on page 8] any and all paid arguments for and against ballot measures and Charter changes. Of all our "civil liberties," this seems to be the most egregious of all and the height of arrogance, as it appears to eliminate publication of pro-and-con debate about merits of each revenue proposal and Charter change.

In the 13 years I've lived, and voted, in San Francisco and have read our voter guides closely before each election, never has there been a prohibition on publishing voter guides arguments, whether for or against ballot or bond measures, or Charter changes. Why the sudden change? What

is the Board of Supervisors afraid of that you suddenly propose to eliminate voter guide arguments that may sway voters?

San Francisco "values," I might remind you Mr. Chiu, have always permitted the citizenry to plop down their hard-earned money to pay for voter guide arguments. Just last November, I sprang \$800 (\$200 in filing fees, and \$2 per word for each word in the maximum 300-word limit, for a total of \$800), to exercise my free speech, first amendment rights for a voter guide statement. I could have sorely used that \$800 for other purposes, including my neglected wardrobe. Instead, I chose to spend money, not on "free speech," but "paid speech," in which I freely chose to use my limited discretionary cash on a matter of great public concern.

Now I'm being told, via this proposed ordinance authorizing the June 2 special election in San Francisco, that even if I wanted to spend, and can afford, another \$800 helping to educate voters on what they are about to vote on, that my free (err, costly) speech will simply not be permitted.

Any excuse that there is suddenly an "emergency" doesn't carry water. When I submitted my November 2008 voter guide argument, I had to do so by August 14, 2008, fully two-and-a-half months in advance. Here we are five months out from a June 2009 election, and you expect me to believe that there is not a two-and-a-half-month period in which I could submit a paid argument and have it printed? Or that you can't shorten the two-and-a-half months lead time to some shorter period, in which I'd be eligible to submit a paid argument (for or against) in a shorter period of time?

May I suggest that you need to get a hold of President Obama, and quickly. After all, San Francisco values do not condone curtailment of free speech.

Perhaps he has a lesson you might learn early in your Board presidency, if only you'd stop Citizen Peskin from whispering in your ear.

Eliminating free speech is not a San Francisco value, President Chiu, that you want dogging you the rest of your political career, is it?

The initial plans for the June 2 election proposes the following revenue measures (or variants thereof) that will be decided behind closed doors, limiting public comment on each or every change on each and every measure being proposed:

- 1. A possible increase of the sales tax by 0.5% to a total of 9% (this will hit the poorest the hardest). $\overline{}$
- 2. A possible payroll tax increase of 0.2%, to a total tax rate of 1.7% (small businesses, and large ones, will feel this).
- 3. A possible new residential utilities users tax, not to exceed 7.5% (everyone will feel this one).
- 4. A possible increase in the commercial utilities users tax, not to exceed 2.5%, for a total tax rate of 10%.
- 5. A possible parcel tax, not to exceed \$300 for a residential parcel

and \$1,000 for other parcels.

- 6. A possible new gross receipts tax on residential rental income, not to exceed 0.127%.
- 7. A possible new gross receipts tax on commercial rental income, not to exceed 0.127%.
- 8. A possible new gross receipts tax on all commercial transactions, not to exceed 0.1%.
- 9. A possible new surcharge on the parking tax, the surcharge not to exceed 5%, for a total tax rate of 30%.

and two new Charter Changes:

10. A possible amendment to Charter Section 9.113.5, allowing the City to appropriate up to 100% of the current balance in the Rainy Day Reserve [fund], not to exceed 20% of the projected deficit, in years in which a budgetary deficit of \$250 million or more is projected, and 11. A possible new Charter amendment that would cap all set-asides at their FY 08-09 levels, allow the City to reduce its contributions during budgetary shortfalls, and provide that year-end surpluses be returned to the General Fund.

You can't seriously believe that I have NOTHING to say about some of these regressive taxes that will hit poor people the hardest, do you?

Tons of millions of Toxic Dirt - much of it from the Santa Fe Operations and others from the worst possible landfill - buried at Mission Bay have not been abated and mitigated. Most of Mission Bay is prone to LIQUEFACTION. This City and County of San Francisco - prompted by GREED has failed to clean-up Mission Bay. Mission Bay looks good outside - but stinks to high heaven and daily - exposes thousands to pollution of the worst kind.

Most of us have little knowledge about the wet-lands that were present all over Mission Bay. Those in their 60s and 70 who were active and loved fishing will tell you stories - about Mission Bay - the Piers, the Fishing - and of course the wet-land and landfills.

Others that lived in San Francisco in the early 30s, 40s,, and 50s have even more vivid memories and will tell you - more. The old copies of the Examiner and Chronicle reveal some and there a few books that delve into - landfill and liquefaction.

The hundreds of companies and factories that dealt with chrome, paint products, old tires, chemicals of a kind including DDT - threw their waste close by and the best places - these folks could find that suited them - were the wet-lands at Mission Bay.

Add to that furniture, construction material, and a myriad of toxic stuff and you had a cesspool - this nonsense went on for years.

In the late 1970s the Environmental Protection Agency formulated strict rules about dumping - but these were not enforced - until the late 1980s. Even today the Environmental Protection Agency is inept and its enforcement at Mission Bay, Hunters Point, Visitation Valley - next to nothing.

The Department of Toxic and Substance Control is even worse.

You file a complaint and you will get a response after years. Enforcement is rarely done - and if anything is done at all - with much fun fare and the wrong persons - getting credit.

Case in point the 20 tons of very toxic dirt removed from Pier 92 after I brought it to the attention of the Department of Toxic and Substances Control.

At Mission Bay there are hundreds of Toxic Hot Spots and for years - soil was dug and piled up - most

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To Whom It May Concern:

My name is Annie Folger. I am a Supporter of Access SF. Empowering public speech and encouraging civic participation are just two of the reasons why Access SF deserves the level of support to enable it to thrive, not just survive!

I am greatly concerned about the future of public access in San Francisco. Access SF provides community members training in television and Internet production as well as access to channels on which their programs can be shown. Without public access, the City loses diverse, community-based programming developed by independent media producers and nonprofits.

Digital Infrastructure and Video Competition Act (DIVCA) threatens public access funding. Because of the law, cities are no longer permitted to negotiate local cable franchises nor require operational funding for public access. Without this source of revenue, the City has limited operational funds to grant to the local operator of public access.

The City is planning to drastically cut operational funding for Access SF July 1. 2009. The level of funding being proposed would result in greatly reduced staffing causing significant cuts in services.

I strongly urge you to find a way to support public access in San Francisco. The resources provided by this community center cannot be replaced by YouTube or any similar Internet-based video site. Cable operators provide millions of dollars per year to the City as part of their franchise agreements. Currently, San Francisco allocates only about \$100,000 of these millions to support public access. In addition, Congress and the State Legislature must change the provision in the Telecommunications Act of 1934 and DIVCA eliminating the prohibition of these funds from being used for operational expenses.



Per your request the included documents provide the following information:

1- A statement of revenue and expenditures for the Golf Fund by course.

2- Budgeted Position Detail for the Golf Fund by Course

3- Rounds played by course

4- Description of departmental and citywide overhead costs and their allocation to the Golf Fund

Some revenue and expenditures are not captured by individual golf courses, but instead are called 'Golf Unallocated.' The revenues which are not allocated are interest earned by the fund and revenues collected from issued resident golf cards. The expenditures are mainly the citywide overhead (COWCAP) costs, and the workorder to central shops for the repair and maintenance of all equipment used by all golf courses.



OVERHEAD

I. Recreation and Park Overhead Fund

The overhead fund centralizes all the costs associated with operational administrative staff, contracts, materials and supplies and work orders to other City Departments for services necessary to run the operations of the Department on an annual basis. Total fund is \$25,191,603 for FY 08-09 and is broken down as follows (further detail on expenditure line items appears on the following pages):

Total costs in the overhead fund provide one of the basic components of what is commonly known as the Cost Allocation Plan. Mention of this always brings us to the question, "Why do we need a Cost Allocation Plan?" The primary answer is because City codes mandate that if you have a Capital Program you must have a valid cost allocation plan that spreads administrative costs equitably across funding streams. With a valid Plan in place, the types of administrative costs described on the following pages, become the overhead charges related to a project. Thus, we can **capture and charge** the full costs associated with a capital project – not just the direct contractual costs of building/renovating a property.

The second basic component in a Cost Allocation Plan is budgeted FTE count in each program. Once we have a valid FTE count in each of the Department's Programs, we can use the same cost allocation plan to capture and charge operational programs in the same fashion. This provides us with even more definitive information on both true capital project costs and operational program costs throughout the department. For example:

Without an overhead fund and associated cost allocation plan, if we are asked what the total cost of the Aquatics Program is in the Department, we respond as follows:



With a cost allocation plan in place, we can add the overhead costs based on the 48.82 FTE's budgeted for the Aquatics Program. Thus, the total cost becomes quite different as follows:

| Salaries | \$2,237,807 |
|------------------------|-------------------|

Had we given the first answer above, we would have only provided 77% of the true costs of the Aquatics Program. By adding the overhead costs, we have displayed aquatic costs related to equipment, light, heat and power, telecommunications, paycheck processing, sewer service, to name a few, based on the FTE count in the Program. As you can see, the \$4.2 million is a much more accurate answer and must be the figure we use when discussing true program costs.

Please see graphic below that depicts how the Overhead Fund and Cost Allocation Plan works with the Department's funding streams:



Funding streams that support the costs of operational overhead:

General Fund supports \$14.6 million or 64%

Open Space supports \$6.2 million or 27%

Golf supports \$1.2 million or 5%

Yacht supports \$0.3 million or 1%

Capital Projects, Gifts, Bequests, etc. supports \$0.8 million or 3%

II. COWCAP - City and County of San Francisco Coast Allocation Plan

The Citywide cost allocation plan, generally referred to as COWCAP functions similarly to the departmental overhead fund. It summarizes of all the central administrative Citywide services and allocates them to departments based on various criteria.

Examples of some of the centralized costs are costs related to the Board of Supervisors, The Mayor, the Controller's Office including accounting and payroll, Human Resources, Building Deprecation etc. Costs are allocated based on criteria that most accurately determine a department's fair share of the costs. For example, building depreciation is allocated to departments based on the net square footage that they occupy. Payroll costs are allocated based on the number average payroll remittances for 4 pay periods.

Once citywide COWCAP costs are allocated to departments, the Recreation and Park Department's portion is allocated to the Golf fund and other Special revenue funds based on those funds percentage of the department's budget. A copy of COWCAP with more information on costs and allocations can be obtained by contacting the Controller's Office.

A half-baked congestion plan

ome eco-friendly ideas may be too much even for San Francis-co. That's the general reaction to a plan to charge \$3 to drive into the downtown area in the name of controlling traffic and raising money for transit.

The Board of Supervisors will get a

chance to consider the outlines of a congestion pricing proposal by April with further approvals possibly in a The members should be skeptical of an idea that's drawn heavy verbal crossfire at public meetings, opposition business and from doubts about its practicality, finances and chances for success.

Outside a coterie of planners and hard-core enthusiasts, the notion of paying more to drive on relatively unclogged city streets isn't ready for prime time.

Also, the second intended effect nudging drivers into public transit may further burden overtaxed systems such as BART and Muni, which can be inconvenient, unreliable and jammed. The pricing system is expected to raise from \$30 million to \$60 million per year, a relatively small amount for transit budgets. In sum, it's a concept that's loaded with uncertainties, which argues for further study and debate.

San Francisco, with its dense building patterns, is already a petri dish for ways to pry people from their cars. The city has plans for extensive bike lanes, parking meters with adjustable rates, bus-only driving lanes and redrawn transit lines. For years, planning rules have limited huge parking garages to

dissuade driving and given public transit preference. Muni, for all its problems, remains one of the most heavily used systems in the nation.

The city's official slogan might as well be: Don't Drive Here:

Congestion pricing could strain the public support that is needed for more sensible, workable efforts to get people out of their cars. The specter of overdoing it may explain why Mayor Gayin Newsom, who talked up the idea a year ago, is now decidedly


cool on it. New York Mayor Michael Bloomberg rolled out a congestion pricing plan for ultra-crowded Manhattan — and had it shot down by the state Legislature.

This region should continue to brainstorm ways to cut vehicle tailpipe emissions, roadway traffic and lost commute time. But this particular plan seems more about raising revenue than deterring people from thiving in a city that already is difficult and expensive to navigate.

SEC. 67.23. PUBLIC REVIEW FILE--POLICY BODY COMMUNICATIONS.

(a) The clerk of the Board of Supervisors and the clerk of each board and commission enumerated in the charter shall maintain a file, accessible to any person during normal office hours, containing a copy of any letter, memorandum or other communication which the clerk has distributed to or received from a quorum of the policy body concerning a matter calendared by the body within the previous 30 days or likely to be calendared within the next 30 days, irrespective of subject matter, origin or recipient, except commercial solicitations, periodical publications or communications exempt from disclosure under the California Public Records Act (Government Code Section 6250 et seq.) and not deemed disclosable under Section 67.24 of this article.

(b) Communications, as described in subsection (a), sent or received in the last three business days shall be maintained in chronological order in the office of the department head or at a place nearby, clearly designated to the public. After documents have been on file for two full days, they may be removed, and, in the discretion of the board or commission, placed in a monthly chronological file.

(c) Multiple-page reports, studies or analyses which are accompanied by a letter or memorandum of transmittal need not be included in the file so long as the letter or memorandum of transmittal is included.

You are right about the problem of taking items out of order being a problem though often they have a general public comment item at the beginning and you could speak then saying you will not be able to stay till the item is called later.

Kimo, first, I apologize for asking about the complaint form. I was just so energized (with anger) and then determined, that I went ahead, to get the matter out. When I wrote and asked, at that moment I intended to do it later.

I do write to the Commission sometimes. At one time I understood that these communications went into binders, which were kept (somewhere). These binders are at Commission meetings, and they have some of what goes to Commissioners before the meeting. If you are a speed reader you can go early and hope to read what the Commissioners receive; if you are lucky and no one else is using the binder. But one time when I got lucky I noticed that my letter was not in the binder. I asked. Such communications no longer go into the binder. I was assured that they did go to the Commissioners electronically. But whether there is any record, I don't know. (Commissioners have said things that indicate to me that they had read...this verified for me.)

I rarely go to meetings. Three minutes is too little for all the time to go and wait. (The liberal practice of taking items out of agenda order adds substantially to the potential time waste.)

When I got on the Citizens Advisory Committee I did publish something about my involvement and about the water improvement program a couple of times in our newsletter, along with my email. I never heard a word of interest. Water bills are small potatoes. (But recently they are rising by 15% per year, and recently things have happened that will tend to make larger rises than are planned necessary.) My overall impression is, 1. 70% of SF rent, and don't care a bit about water/sewer bills, and 2. homeowners are so

well off here that they don't care. (Slightly off topic illustration: at our homeowners' annual meeting one homeowner got up and said that our annual bill was so low it was usually first believed to be monthly; and then, "I'd gladly pay per month what we are billed per year." There was hardly a rustle in the crowd. I was stunned. Had to confirm with others that I'd heard right.)

I agree that government spending and fiscal manipulation is out of control. Back in the '80s and all through the 90s money was just moved from water to the general fund. That is why we needed a bond measure in 2002 to borrow to fix up the deteriorated system. We should have been fixing it with the three-quarters of a billion dollars siphoned off to the general fund so that politicos could pay and play. Finally a proposition put the squeeze on the siphon. But, they've found ways around it: the \$9.9 million to buy the lot for the Taj is one example of that, and all the "hiring" of other departments to do some "work" is another.

Perhaps there will be opportunities, if this downturn starts to bite. I've followed this for years, and it's been a slog through the desert. While I'd rather be irrelevant and richer, if poorer, perhaps there is a silver lining out there. I'll be watching.

Again, you are right; I should have waited for your advice--once I sought it--and not subsequently decided to plow on. And I will endeavor not to repeat that sort of thing.

First let me say that I appreciate the watchdog role you provide here.

I think if you sent letters to the SFPUC communication file then there would be an ongoing log on the public record of your concerns

Also I do take time out of my day to provide you advise – so if you aren't interested in it "Do I have to complete a form?" then please don't ask for it...

The only way to stop them from ignoring is to file complaints and then they realize it is easier to comply than to fight or ignore. — also not the Draft exemption under CPRA state law is explicitly repealed under Sunshine — they cannot withhold a draft (not final) document locally.

SFBG would probably run something (Leal is no longer there, and even if she was not if you had a well researched balanced story I suspect they would run it anyhow) and possibly the Examiner (fiscal responsibility) = you would just need to package the story appropriately

The things you tell me about fiscal management are outrageous – you need to let people know about it now - otherwise it will not stop. No one is going to care after there is an earthquake – there will be too many other problems and there will be no accountability after the fact – it has to happen during construction.

Do you go to SFPUC meetings and make public comment about your concerns? Lawyers and the press (sometimes) attend those meetings – and again do you talk with neighborhood groups who pay property taxes?

Kimo, thank you for your advice. I did end up printing a form, filling it out by hand, and faxing it in.

The two matters I have are both minor, and I may lose. I don't much care. The larger point is disrespect. If they learn they can just ignore, that's certainly what they will do. The one matter they just refuse to give any answer. The other they play the game "it's not final". After more than six months of that, one must stand or be proved a patsy. So it was high time to file, and I'll go the full distance if I possibly can, too, because that is the real message needing to be sent. (I dropped off the Citizens Advisory Comm, so they may think I'm less willing. Also Prop I lost badly (thanks to progressives); I was associated with that; independent ratepayer advocate.)

On your final question, I'm not getting the message out, except to a very few interested citizens. The papers, the Chamber and Spur, which all strongly supported 2002 prop A, which funded and launched this program, the mayor, and the supes have zero interest. Yesterday's paper writes about a closely related matter—the emergency water system for earthquakes—yet never even mentions the Water System Improvement Program which is spending about \$2250 for each and every citizen of San Francisco, plus another more than \$2.5 billion for the suburban users. Are we all so rich that spending of that amount is inconsequential? It seems so. No schedule for the program has held (or even remotely close). Yet politicians and others routinely accept the latest fiction, unquestioningly. The Establishment folk whose support got the money? See ya...we're out of here! the moment the 2002 election passed the bonds; no interest whatsoever in following up or making sure the job got done.

As it's all under the radar, corruption (soft variety) rules, and the money is wasted. Leal used her tenure as GM to lay the groundwork for running for mayor. The program hardly progressed at all under her. But, she spent lots and lots of money, gave money to other departments, and consultants owe her lots of favors.

But until a) there is an actual earthquake, or b) the suburban water users move to take over the regional system for SF's default in doing the program, no one wants to think about it and this program that only I follow will be unknown. Bay Guardian isn't going to run anything; they love Leal. Minor papers (Westside...) might, possibly, but at best there would be a blip of interest soon dead.

I'm resigned to watching, if I can. It's up to SFPUC. Ed Harrington seems genuinely to want to accomplish the job, which is a huge step forward; the last two GMs did not. But the bureaucratic beast eats up everybody and anything. I've tried to convince the union that it's in their interest to get the job done, not have the system taken over. Persuading a union about the long-term is not a skill I've acquired.

There is no requirement to fill out any form and in fact experienced people do not do so... - there have been fights over this and no form is needed. just send an email answering all the questions on the form

The public hearing process can take some time but that is the nature of any hearing in law or government and there is quite value in a full public airing of the matter also one can learn much by listening and helping other complainants and collaborating with other watchdogs

Frank has been generally pushed out of doing SOTF work – not always but do to ongoing complaints by the public about him

Quorum – I recommend you ask for your item to be heard first in the meeting – say you have a child care or doctor appt that will assure a fresh taskforce and best chance that there is a large number of attendees

Most SOTF hearings are in favor of the public – and often – but certainly not always – more records are produced as a result –

One needs to keep in mind that SOTF was designed to give an alternative to going to the long and very costly court process to get records – that is ultimately your other option

I would be happy to review any communications you plan to submit to SOTF to support your complaint and give feedback and to listen to your complaint point and suggest ways to strengthen it and best way to win at SOTF

Kimo and the Sunshine posse:

The evil and bad faith of the SOTF, its staff and procedures are facing me once again. The online form they have you fill out--taking considerable time to do it--simply tells you (ha-ha-ha) that you have failed to fill out a required field, so we have wiped out your submission and all your time has been wasted and is gone. We do not tell you which field you omitted, and we do not restore what you did fill out. If you wish, you can go back and try again, after which you can press the button to submit again...and likely be wiped out again.

There is no reason for such evil other than the intent to harass the would-be submitter; is there?

is there any remedy for "public servants" so enthralled with their own powers and potential for harassment that such tricks are perpetrated?

If I can get past the complaint procedure, there is now an intermediate step that is voluntary. This is a pre-hearing conference or something like that. While I enter this realm with the desire to avoid it to the maximum extent possible, I do not wish to miss something that actually settles matters or saves time. Does anyone have experience with this; is it worthwhile?

I have been to hearings before. These are massive wastes of time. When I last went, after waiting three hours, and estimating that my matter would likely come to hearing in another three hours, I settled. Clearly one must be prepared, with food, reading material, etc. to put in a great deal of time, and the next time I will be better prepared. If it has become worse than my last experience, I would like to know.

The other problem with hearings is that a quorum is required. If a bare quorum is there to hear, and if it appears you do not have one member with you, then you may be pushed to continue the matter you have waited hours to get to hearing. Or, a quorum may simply be lost, and while you have waited five hours of the six, sorry, come back in two months. It was my impression that these problems might be addressed, and I wonder and ask if anyone believes they have been alieviated, and to what extent.

I see that Frank Darby is still in charge. This certainly bodes ill, as this employee starts off the enemy of the Sunshine complainant, is skilled at thwarting him, and is certainly eager to do so; that has been my experience. This is having to pass through the dragon's den. Does anyone have advice how to avoid being scorched?

I try very hard not to enter the realm of Sunshine complaint, but SFPUC makes one do so periodically. Does anyone have advice? In the old days one could actually go through the hearing and win, as I did, and their communications department was furious--why, I don't know. (So what, you lost, big deal; it's not like you are fined.) I gained the feeling there might be some motivation here, but just what is it? Again, if you know what buttons to push, I'd like my time to go to best use.

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

TO ALL AFFECTED AND INTERESTED PARTIES:

During the regulatory process to amend sections 27.20, 27.25, 27.30. 27.35, 27.40, 27.45, 27.50, 27.51, 28.26, 28.27, 28.28, 28.29, 28.48, 28.49, 28.51, 28.52, 28.53, 28.54, 28.55, 28.56, 28.57, and 28.58; and add Section 27.32, Title 14, California Code of Regulations, relating to recreational fishing regulations for federal groundfish and associated species for 2009 and 2010, it was brought to our attention that the language proposed for adoption differs from the language provided to the public with the Initial Statement of Reasons for Regulatory Action (ISOR). Depth constraints changes described in the ISOR as being amended in Emergency Rulemaking file 2008-0815-04E, were actually made in Emergency Rulemaking file 2008-0505-01E and were not properly shown in strikeout-underline format in the regulatory text of the ISOR; and the addition of "or within special closure areas established within a Groundfish Management Area" to subsection 27.20(b) was not described in the ISOR nor was the addition illustrated in the regulatory text of the ISOR.

Attached for your review are copies of the proposed regulatory language, and the language that was provided to the public with the ISOR. Please note that comments will only be accepted on the highlighted text of the proposed regulatory language.

Because these regulations are different from, yet sufficiently related to, the originally proposed regulations the Administrative Procedures Act requires that we make the changes available for written public comment. The Fish and Game Commission is exercising its powers under Section 202 of the Fish and Game Code as these changes will not be available to the public for the full public comment period provided for in Government Code Section 11346.8. Please submit written comments to the Commission office at the above-listed address no later than 5:00 p.m. on February 4, 2009.

Section 27.20, Title 14, CCR, is amended to read:

§ 27.20. Groundfish Management Areas, Seasons, Depths, Exceptions, and Fishery Closure/Rule Change Process Described.

Regulations that follow in sections 27.25 through 27.50 define fishing seasons and depth constraints that are effective within each Groundfish Management Area. These sections apply to take and possession of all 90 species of federally-managed groundfish as defined in Section 1.91. (These species include but are not limited to rockfish, cabezon, lingcod, California scorpionfish, kelp greenling, and some species of sharks, skates and flatfish). Special closures and exceptions to these regulations are also specified. All regulations of sections 27.25 through 27.50 also apply for California sheephead, ocean whitefish, and all greenlings of the genus *Hexagrammos*, which are state-managed species known to associate with federal groundfish.

- (a) Depth Constraints: A depth constraint means that during the open season, the aforementioned species may only be taken or possessed in water depths shallower than the specified general depth contour lines, or alternatively, in waters shoreward of lines approximating a particular depth contour, defined by connecting the appropriate set of waypoints adopted in Federal regulations (50 CFR Part 660, Subpart G).
- (a) Depth Constraints: A depth constraint means that during the open season, the aforementioned species may only be taken or possessed in water depths shallower than the specified depth. Two specific definitions of "depth" apply off California. In waters shallower than 30 fathoms, "depth" is defined by general depth contour lines. In waters equal to or deeper than 30 fathoms, "depth" is defined by approximating a particular depth contour by connecting the appropriate set of waypoints adopted in Federal regulations (50 CFR Part 660, Subpart G).
- (b) <u>Open Season Take, Possession and Transit:</u> During any open season in any Groundfish Management Area, in waters deeper than where fishing is authorized <u>or</u> within special closure areas established within a <u>Groundfish Management Area</u>, it is

unlawful to take or possess the aforementioned species unless a special exception is provided. However, this regulation does not apply in cases where these species are possessed aboard a vesselsvessel in transit with no fishing gear deployed in the water.

(c) <u>Closed Season</u>: During any closed season in any Groundfish Management Area, it is unlawful to take or possess the aforementioned species regardless of depth, unless a special exception is provided.

- (d) California Rockfish Conservation Area: Within any Groundfish Management Area, waters that are closed for these species during specified times and/or closed in specified depths shall be known as the California Rockfish Conservation Area. See Section 27.51.
- (e) Fishery closure and/or rule change: When the department determines, based on the best available scientific information, that an annual harvest limit [optimum yield (OY), recreational harvest guideline, or recreational harvest target] established in regulation by the NOAA Fisheries (National Marine Fisheries Service) for any species of federally-managed groundfish or aggregate group of federal groundfish species has been exceeded or is projected to be exceeded prior to the end of the year or that catches are less than predicted, the following rule changes may occur:
- (1) The department may modify the seasons and/or depth constraints for any species of federally-managed groundfish or aggregate group of federal groundfish species, California sheephead, ocean whitefish, and all greenlings of the genus *Hexagrammos*. Season and/or depth modifications may differ by Groundfish Management Area, mode of fishing, or gear utilized.
- (2) The department may adjust existing bag or sub-bag limits or establish additional bag or sub-bag limits as needed for any species of federally-managed groundfish or aggregate group of federal groundfish species, California sheephead, ocean whitefish, and all greenlings of the genus *Hexagrammos*. Bag limits may differ by Groundfish Management Area, time of year, mode of fishing, or gear utilized.
- (3) The department may adjust existing size limits or establish additional size limits as needed for any species of federally-managed groundfish or aggregate group of federal groundfish species, California sheephead, ocean whitefish, and all greenlings of the genus *Hexagrammos*. Size limits may differ by Groundfish Management Area, time of year, mode of fishing, or gear utilized.
- (f) Notice of closure and/or rule change: The department shall give the public and the National Marine Fisheries Service NOAA Fisheries no less than 10 calendar days' notice of any fishery closure or rule change implemented pursuant to this Section via a department news release. Anglers and divers are advised to check the current rules before fishing. The latest fishing rules may be found on the department's website at:

 www.dfg.ca.gov/mrd/www.dfg.ca.gov/marine/, or by calling (831) 649-2801 for recorded information, or by contacting a department office.

This Section applies to take and possession of all 90 species of federally-managed groundfish, California sheephead, ocean whitefish, and all greenlings of the genus *Hexagrammos* in the Northern Groundfish Management Area. Federal groundfish include, but are not limited to, rockfish, cabezon, lingcod, California scorpionfish, kelp greenling, and some species of sharks, skates and flatfish. For specific definitions, applicability, and procedures, see sections 1.91 and 27.20. For size limits, possession limits, and other regulations that apply to individual species, see specific sections beginning with Section 27.60.

- (a) The Northern Groundfish Management Area means ocean waters between 42° 00' N. lat. (the Oregon/California border) and 40° 10' N. lat. (near Cape Mendocino, Humboldt County).
- (b) Seasons and depth constraints (except as provided in (c) below):
- (1) January 1 through April 30May 14: Closed.
- (2) May 1May 15 through NovemberSeptember 1September 15: Open for all species only in waters shallower than 20 fathoms in depth as described by general shoreward of lines approximating the 30 fathom depth contour lines, defined by connecting the set of 30 fathom waypoints adopted in Federal regulations (50 CFR Part 660, Subpart G).

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(b) Seasons and depth constraints (except as provided in (c) below):

(1) January and February: January 1 through the last day in February: Closed, except California scorpionfish may be taken or possessed only in waters shoreward of lines approximating the 40-fathom depth contour, defined by connecting the set of 40-fathom waypoints adopted in Federal regulations (50 CFR Part 660, Subpart G).

(2) March: March 1 through March 31: Open for all species, except for lingcod, only in waters shoreward of lines approximating the 60-fathom depth contour, defined by connecting the set of 60-fathom waypoints adopted in Federal regulations (50 CFR Part

Lingcod may not be taken or possessed.

(c) Special exceptions to subsection (b) above:

(1) "Other Flatfish" as defined in subsection 1.91(a)(10), which include Pacific sanddabs, may be taken or possessed in all depths all year, except that when fishing in times or areas closed under subsection (b) above, anglers are limited to not more than 12 No. 2 or smaller hooks and up to 2 pounds of weight. A No. 2 hook means a fishing hook with a gap not greater than 7/16 inch between the hook point and the shank.

(2) Leopard shark may be taken or possessed in Newport Bay, Alamitos Bay, Mission Bay, and San Diego Bay all year.

(3) When angling from shore (includes beaches, banks, piers, jetties, breakwaters, docks, and other man-made structures connected to the shore), all species may be taken or possessed all year, except lingcod may not be taken or possessed under this provision during the months of January, February, March and December. No vessel or watercraft (motorized or non-motorized) may be used to assist in taking or possessing these species while angling from shore under this provision.

(4) When diving or spearfishing, as authorized in Section 28.90, all species may be taken or possessed all year, except lingcod may not be taken or possessed under this provision during the months of January, February, March, and December. Except for spearfishing gear, all other types of fishing gear are prohibited to be aboard the vessel or watercraft (motorized or non-motorized) while spearfishing for the purpose of taking or possessing these species under this provision.

- (a) Depth Constraints: A depth constraint means that during the open season, the aforementioned species may only be taken or possessed in water depths shallower than the specified general depth contour lines, or alternatively, in waters shoreward of lines approximating a particular depth contour, defined by connecting the appropriate set of waypoints adopted in Federal regulations (50 CFR Part 660, Subpart G).
- (a) Depth Constraints: A depth constraint means that during the open season, the aforementioned species may only be taken or possessed in water depths shallower than the specified depth. Two specific definitions of "depth" apply off California. In waters shallower than 30 fathoms, "depth" is defined by general depth contour lines. In waters equal to or deeper than 30 fathoms, "depth" is defined by approximating a particular depth contour by connecting the appropriate set of waypoints adopted in Federal regulations (50 CFR Part 660, Subpart G).
- (b) Open Season Take, Possession and Transit: During any open season in any Groundfish Management Area, in waters deeper than where fishing is authorized or within special closure areas established within a Groundfish Management Area, it is unlawful to take or possess the aforementioned species unless a special exception is

provided. However, this regulation does not apply in cases where these species are possessed aboard <u>a vesselsvessel</u> in transit with no fishing gear <u>deployed</u> in the water.

(c) Closed Season: During any closed season in any Groundfish Management Area, it is unlawful to take or possess the aforementioned species regardless of depth, unless a special exception is provided.

- (d) California Rockfish Conservation Area: Within any Groundfish Management Area, waters that are closed for these species during specified times and/or closed in specified depths shall be known as the California Rockfish Conservation Area. See Section 27.51.
- (e) Fishery closure and/or rule change: When the department determines, based on the best available scientific information, that an annual harvest limit [optimum yield (OY), recreational harvest guideline, or recreational harvest target] established in regulation by the NOAA Fisheries (National Marine Fisheries Service) for any species of federally-managed groundfish or aggregate group of federal groundfish species has been exceeded or is projected to be exceeded prior to the end of the year or that catches are less than predicted, the following rule changes may occur:
- (1) The department may modify the seasons and/or depth constraints for any species of federally-managed groundfish or aggregate group of federal groundfish species, California sheephead, ocean whitefish, and all greenlings of the genus *Hexagrammos*. Season and/or depth modifications may differ by Groundfish Management Area, mode of fishing, or gear utilized.
- (2) The department may adjust existing bag or sub-bag limits or establish additional bag or sub-bag limits as needed for any species of federally-managed groundfish or aggregate group of federal groundfish species, California sheephead, ocean whitefish, and all greenlings of the genus *Hexagrammos*. Bag limits may differ by Groundfish Management Area, time of year, mode of fishing, or gear utilized.
- (3) The department may adjust existing size limits or establish additional size limits as needed for any species of federally-managed groundfish or aggregate group of federal groundfish species, California sheephead, ocean whitefish, and all greenlings of the genus *Hexagrammos*. Size limits may differ by Groundfish Management Area, time of year, mode of fishing, or gear utilized.
- (f) Notice of closure and/or rule change: The department shall give the public and the National Marine Fisheries Service NOAA Fisheries no less than 10 calendar days' notice of any fishery closure or rule change implemented pursuant to this Section via a department news release. Anglers and divers are advised to check the current rules before fishing. The latest fishing rules may be found on the department's website at: www.dfg.ca.gov/marine/, or by calling (831) 649-2801 for recorded information, or by contacting a department office.

(1) January 1 through April 30 May 14: Closed.

- (2) May 1May 15 through Nevember September 1September 15: Open for all species only in waters shallower than 20 fathoms in depth as described by general depth contour lines.
- (3) December September 2 through December 31 September 16 through December 31: Open for all species, except for lingcod, only in waters shallower than 20 fathoms in depth as described by general depth contour lines., Lingcod may not be taken or possessed. Closed.

- (4) When diving or spearfishing, as authorized in Section 28.90, all species may be taken or possessed all year, except lingcod may not be taken or possessed under this provision during the months of January, February, March, and December. Except for spearfishing gear, all other types of fishing gear are prohibited to be aboard the vessel or watercraft (motorized or non-motorized) while spearfishing for the purpose of taking or possessing these species under this provision.





"COACH" LARRY KANE January 20, 2009

For the last 16 years, Larry Kane has spent his afternoons, evenings and weekends with inner-city high school students as a mentor, college and career counselor, tutor and wrestling coach. As Coach for the Galileo Academy of Science wrestling team, he has coached boys and girls from all districts of San Francisco, including the Bayriew, Western Addition, Tenderloin, and the Mission. During that time, all of the seniors on the Galileo team have graduated from high school, and a substantial number have continued on to college. Galileo wrestling alumni have won scholarships to Harvard, UC-Berkeley, UC Davis and UCLA.

Larry Kane has returned the Coach's salary to the program as a donation every year and made significant additional personal donations to fund the program. "We are very proud of our team's league record of 96-13-1 and overall record of 121-23-1, including 51 Individual City Champions. "We have had seven League Championships and five City Championships." Coach Kane himself is a 1978 National AAU Wrestling Champion and 1979 National AAU Runnerup for his high school age group and weight class.

Coach Kane was born in Rochester, New York, as the 6th of 8 children, and attended public high school in Penfield, New York. While neither of his parents graduated from college, they valued education and emphasized the importance of hard work. Coach Kane says "I wanted to coach wrestling to give the students the same opportunity to learn the life skills that I gained from wrestling such as work ethic, commitment, discipline, motivation, self-esteem and teamwork." "The skills that I learned from athletics enabled me to succeed, and coaching wrestling was the natural way for me to give something back to the community."

Coach Kane is also a Partner at the Law Firm of Orrick, Herrington & Sutcliffe LLP, where he has practiced corporate law for emerging companies since October 1987. He was named one of the Top 300 Attorneys in Silicon Valley by San Jose Magazine in 2004 through 2008, and is a frequent speaker at various legal and educational programs ranging from the Haas School of Business, the Practicing Law Institute to venture capital forums, and he is a member of the California and New York Bars. He earned a JD from Columbia School of Law in 1987, was a Stone Scholar, a Rhodes Scholar semi-finalist, Editor of the Journal of Transnational Law, and was awarded the Frank Hogan Scholarship. He also served as President of the Columbia Alumni Association of Northern California from 1991 to 1996, and is a member of the San Francisco Bike Coalition. Coach Kane bikes to work every day.

Coach Kane earned his BA from Columbia College in 1984. He was elected both Senior Class President and Captain of the Wrestling Team, which won Ivy League Honors for three consecutive years. Coach Kane's Columbia College classmates awarded him the Edward Sutliff Brainard Memorial Prize, granted to the senior deemed most worthy of distinction for qualities of mind and character.

Mayor Newsom appointed Coach Kane to the SF Library Commission in April 2006. Coach Kane served on the Prop H Commission in 2005. In addition, Coach Kane serves on the Board of Directors of the San Francisco School Alliance, Aim High (the Award winning free summer program serving 1200 students each summer) and Greatschools.net. Coach Kane provides frequent probono service to many non profits, including the Hispanic Scholarship Fund, the Chinese American Education Committee and the California Historical Society.

In July 2000, Coach Kane married Christina Flood Kane, a Middle School Spanish Teacher at the Hamlin School. They have two daughters, Charlotte, born in August 2003 and Caitlyn born in September 2005. Charlotte and Caitlyn are 6th generation San Franciscans.
