3 COMMENDING THE NATIONAL ASSOCIATION FOR THE ADVANCEMENT
4 OF COLORED PEOPLE FOR ITS OPPOSITION TO THE SYMBOLISM OF THE
5 CONFEDERATE FLAG.

7 WHEREAS, The National Association for the Advancement of Colored People
8 (NAACP) has stated its strict opposition, not only to the symbolism of, but also to the
9 use of and reference to, the Confederate flag; and,

10 WHEREAS, The NAACP has launched a tourism boycott against the state of
11 South Carolina, which still flies the flag atop its state Capitol building in Columbia, and
12 which also does not recognize Martin Luther King, Jr. federal holiday as a state
13 holiday; and,

15 WHEREAS, The state's Black Coaches Association has formally requested that
16 the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) refrain from scheduling
17 tournaments in the state until legislators remove the flag; and,

19 WHEREAS, Our protests against racism and prejudice should be waged with
20 consistency for all ethnic groups alike (i.e. opposition to use of a swastika and to
21 discrimination against homosexuals); now, therefore be it

22 RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San
23 Francisco fully supports the National Association for the Advancement of Colored
24 People for its opposition to the symbolism of the Confederate flag.


