Resolution urging the Arts Commission to solicit and the City Hall building manager to determine an appropriate location for the installation of a permanent piece of artwork honoring Supervisor Harvey Milk in San Francisco City Hall.

WHEREAS, Harvey Milk was born May 22, 1930 in Woodmere, Long Island, New York. He became a successful Wall Street investment analyst; and

WHEREAS, Harvey Milk was elected in 1977 as Supervisor for District 5, which at the time included The Castro, Duboce Triangle and Haight/Ashbury districts of San Francisco and was the first elected openly gay man in the United States; and,

WHEREAS, Supervisor Milk played an essential role in the story of the emergence of the gay community in the Castro District of the 1970s and envisioned a path to human rights for gay people everywhere and dedicated himself to lead the lesbian and gay communities in the struggle to attain that goal; and,

WHEREAS, Supervisor Milk fought not for the universal acceptance of homosexuality as "an alternate life-style", but for a universal acceptance of homosexuals as human beings, endowed by their creator with the same unalienable rights as their heterosexual counterparts; and,

WHEREAS, Supervisor Milk's entire political career was dedicated to shattering the silence of homosexual America and exposing the homophobic myths of heterosexual America and Supervisor Milk's assassination on November 27, 1979, was a homophobic attack not only on gay men, lesbians and sexual minorities, but also an attack on all people everywhere; and,

WHEREAS, Harvey Milk was one of the most charismatic and pragmatic populists of the past half-century, a man of remarkable organizational talent who never compromised his vision of "a city of neighborhoods," a city rich in the diversity of cultures; and,

WHEREAS, By concentrating on implementing an aggressively populist agenda which encompassed the needs of all of San Francisco's minorities, Milk quickly dispelled the false issue of his sexual orientation, and his passionate attention to detail and his dedication to improving the quality of life of all San Franciscans greatly widened his base of support; and,

WHEREAS, There is no memorial in City Hall, San Francisco, that would preserve the legacy of Supervisor Milk for posterity;

RESOLVED, That The Board of Supervisors hereby establishes as policy of the City and County of San Francisco that artwork honoring Harvey Milk and his unique contributions to San Francisco history and to that of the world be commissioned and installed in City Hall; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That The Board of Supervisors urges the Arts Commission to solicit and the City Hall Building Manager to determine an appropriate location for the installation of a permanent piece of artwork honoring the life and times of Supervisor Harvey Milk in San Francisco City Hall.
