3 **Ordinance amending the Health Code to require the Department of Public Health to**
4 **maintain and operate at full capacity an 55-bed adult residential facility with no fewer**
5 **than 41 beds.**

13 Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco:

14 Section 1. The Health Code is hereby amended by adding Article 45, consisting of
15 Sections 4501, 4502, and 4503, to read as follows:

16 **ARTICLE 45: CITY-OPERATED ADULT RESIDENTIAL FACILITY**

17
18 **SEC. 4501. BACKGROUND AND FINDINGS.**

19 *(a) Adult residential facilities (“ARFs”) are group care facilities that provide 24-hour*
20 *nonmedical care to individuals aged 18-59 who need personal services, supervision, or assistance to*
21 *support their activities of daily living. ARFs provide rooms, meals, housekeeping, supervision, storage*
22 *and distribution of medications, and personal care assistance with basic activities like hygiene,*
23 *dressng, eating, and bathing. ARFs are licensed by the Community Care Licensing Division of the*
24 *State Department of Social Services (“CCL”).*
25

1 **(b)** ARFs play an important role in a locality's continuum of care by providing people with
2 mental illness an opportunity to live in community-based housing, rather than in institutional care.

3 **(c)** A 2018 report by the California Behavioral Health Planning Council observed that due
4 to ARF closures and a lack of new ARFs, many individuals with mental illness are not able to find
5 sustainable community housing options with the appropriate level of care following stays in acute in-
6 patient treatment programs, hospitals, or correctional institutions. The report concludes that the
7 absence of community-based housing options can result in a "revolving door scenario" where people
8 are discharged or released from an institution only to be unable to find appropriate residential care or
9 housing. When another mental health crisis ensues, the absence of community-based housing
10 opportunities can result in a return to high-level crisis programs, facilities, hospitals, jails/prisons, or
11 homelessness.

12 **(d)** Since 2005, the San Francisco Department of Public Health ("DPH") has operated an
13 ARF at 887 Potrero Avenue. This ARF has been licensed by CCL to include 55 beds.

14 **(e)** In recent years, DPH has failed to maintain staffing at a level that was sufficient to
15 operate the ARF at 887 Potrero Avenue at full capacity. In 2018-2019, DPH asked CCL for permission
16 to temporarily suspend from licensure a total of 41 ARF beds at 887 Potrero Avenue so that they could
17 be used instead as emergency shelter beds for people experiencing homelessness. CCL granted DPH's
18 request, thereby temporarily reducing the total number of beds at this ARF from 55 to ~~44~~14. CCL's
19 approval extends through June 30, 2024~~0~~, although DPH may seek CCL approval to restore the beds
20 for use as ARF beds prior to that date subject to CCL's finding that DPH can meet the licensing
21 standards required to operate the ARF at full capacity.

22 **(f)** In October 2018, CCL concluded that on a number of occasions between 2015 and
23 2018, DPH had failed to comply with applicable laws and regulations in its administration of the ARF
24 at 887 Potrero Avenue. To bring the facility into compliance, CCL required that DPH prepare a
25 corrective action plan, which DPH prepared and submitted to CCL on October 15, 2018 ("Corrective

1 Action Plan”). This plan lays out the steps DPH has taken and will continue to take, including training
2 and monitoring, to ensure that the ARF operates in full compliance with all applicable standards.

3
4 **SEC. 4502. MAINTENANCE AND OPERATION OF ADULT RESIDENTIAL FACILITY.**

5 (a) As of the effective date of this Article 45, and until March 31, 2020, DPH shall
6 operate 28 of the beds at the ARF located at 887 Potrero Avenue as emergency shelter beds
7 for people experiencing homelessness.

8 (ab) As of the effective date of this Article 45 By no later than April 1, 2020, and from
9 that date forward, DPH shall maintain and operate at full capacity a licensed 55-bed adult residential
10 facility with no fewer than 41 beds, and shall take all steps necessary to ensure that all 55 ARF beds
11 are occupied by persons who meet the eligibility criteria for residence in an adult residential facility set
12 forth in State law and in the facility’s license.

13 (bc) To ensure compliance with the deadlines established in subsections (a) and (b), DPH
14 shall take immediate action to:

15 (1) Notify CCL of its intent to operate 54 ARF beds, and take all steps necessary
16 to ensure licensure of all 54 ARF beds;

17 (2) Identify clinically appropriate alternative placements for five ARF
18 residents, and work with those residents to facilitate their voluntary relocation. Patients who
19 are offered clinically appropriate alternative placements shall be given the opportunity to
20 discuss their options with the ombudsman program before being transferred;

21 (23) Hire a sufficient number of qualified City staff to operate the 54 ARF beds;
22 and

23 (34) Identify residents who qualify for placement in any available ARF beds on or
24 after April 1, 2020.

1 ~~(ed)~~ *Staff from the Department of Human Resources (“DHR”) shall assist DPH to*
2 *immediately, and with urgency, hire qualified City staff.*

3 ~~(e)~~ DPH shall provide trauma-informed care training to all DPH staff who work at
4 DPH’s Behavioral Health Center located at 887 Potrero Ave on the following topics: trauma-
5 informed care, patient safety, evidence-based de-escalation techniques, medication
6 management, risk management, first aid and cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR), and
7 detention for evaluation and treatment under Section 5150 of the California Welfare and
8 Institutions Code. These trainings shall be provided by subject matter experts who do not
9 work at the Behavioral Health Center.

10 ~~(f)~~ DPH shall create a forum in which management and staff of the ARF located at
11 887 Potrero Avenue can discuss issues relating to resident care and workplace conditions,
12 and shall conduct an objective analysis and review of the Behavioral Health Center.

13
14 **SEC. 4503. REPORTING.**

15 ~~Within three months of the effective date of this Article 45~~ By no later than March 31,
16 2020, DPH and DHR shall jointly submit to the Board of Supervisors a report summarizing the
17 actions it has taken in compliance with this Article 45, and its objective analysis and review of
18 the Behavioral Health Center report that describes:

19 ~~(a)~~ The number of ARF beds that have been filled and the number that remain
20 vacant;

21 ~~(b)~~ The number of personnel hired to work at the ARF; and

22 ~~(c)~~ The steps that DPH has taken to ensure compliance with the Corrective Action
23 Plan.

1 Section 2. Effective Date. This ordinance shall become effective 30 days after
2 enactment. Enactment occurs when the Mayor signs the ordinance, the Mayor returns the
3 ordinance unsigned or does not sign the ordinance within ten days of receiving it, or the Board
4 of Supervisors overrides the Mayor's veto of the ordinance.

5
6 Section 3. Undertaking for the General Welfare. In enacting and implementing this
7 ordinance, the City is assuming an undertaking only to promote the general welfare. It is not
8 assuming, nor is it imposing on its officers and employees, an obligation for breach of which it
9 is liable in money damages to any person who claims that such breach proximately caused
10 injury.
