[Supporting California Senate Bill No. 905 (Wiener) - Closing the "Locked Door" Loophole In Auto Break-In Burglary Cases]

Resolution supporting California State Senate Bill No. 905, introduced by Senator Scott Wiener, to close the "locked door loophole" that creates barriers to successfully prosecuting auto burglary.

WHEREAS, Vehicle break-ins have been a persistent problem in the Bay Area and particularly San Francisco where more than a thousand such incidents occur each month, resulting in significant property loss and discouraging tourism to the City; and

WHEREAS, Recent trends show that auto break-ins have dropped significantly during the last quarter of 2023, including a 53% drop in thefts from vehicles in October 2023 compared to October 2022 as well as a 48% decrease in larceny theft between November 20th to New Year's Day 2023 compared to the same period in 2022; and

WHEREAS, The reduction in smash-and-grab reports and larceny theft incidents coincides with increased resources employed by the San Francisco Police Department to combat these crimes, including bait cars, plainclothes officers, and video surveillance; and

WHEREAS, In order to convict a suspect, existing state law mandates that prosecutors prove a vehicle was locked at the time of the incident, regardless of overwhelming evidence that a person entered a vehicle without permission, such as a broken window; and

WHEREAS, Existing law also requires that victims physically come to court to testify as to whether their car door was locked or not, which can often sabotage clear cases of guilt; and

WHEREAS, The City and County of San Francisco must explicitly make it clear that any individual who commits auto burglary will be arrested and prosecuted in the best effort to make our streets safer for residents and visitors; and WHEREAS, California State Senate Bill No. 905 will further deter more burglaries from happening, making San Francisco safer by empowering law enforcement to prosecute more clear cases of guilt; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco supports California State Senate Bill No. 905; and, be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Clerk of the Board send a copy of this Resolution to Governor Gavin Newsom, President pro-Tempore Toni G. Atkins, and Speaker of the State Assembly Robert Rivas.
