[Supporting the Right to Peacefully Assemble and Protest and Denouncing Militarized Suppression of Protests]

Resolution affirming the public's right to peacefully assemble and protest actions of the federal government, condemning the militarization of civil response to peaceful protests, and reaffirming San Francisco's commitment to immigrant justice and the City's Sanctuary Ordinance.

WHEREAS, San Francisco has long been a national symbol of resistance, where peaceful protest is not only protected by the United States Constitution but embraced as essential to justice and democracy; and

WHEREAS, From civil rights marches to labor pickets and immigrant solidarity rallies, San Franciscans have shown that change begins when people speak out; and

WHEREAS, On June 5, 2025, at least fifteen people, including a three-year-old child, were detained by federal immigration agents at a San Francisco ICE Field Office during what advocates described as a routine check-in; and

WHEREAS, Such actions traumatize families, and erode trust in public institutions intended to serve and protect all residents; and

WHEREAS, The State of California has sued the federal government, alleging that President Trump's deployment of National Guard troops to Los Angeles over the objection of state and local elected leaders violates the United States Constitution, and State Senator Scott Wiener has warned that these actions represent "an aggressive move toward a fascist police state," including threats to arrest the Governor of California; and

WHEREAS, Protestors across California and in San Francisco have mobilized in response, calling for the protection of immigrants, the demilitarization of civic life, and the upholding of fundamental democratic rights; and

WHEREAS, Journalists play a critical role in documenting public events, safeguarding transparency, and holding power to account, and the First Amendment of the United States Constitution guarantees their freedom to report without government interference or retaliation; and

WHEREAS, Multiple reports from Los Angeles and San Francisco have surfaced of journalists being threatened, harassed, or injured while covering recent protests, raising alarm about violations of press freedom and the chilling of constitutionally protected activity; and

WHEREAS, Immigrants are part of the fabric of San Francisco's neighborhoods, raising families, operating small businesses, teaching in schools, and powering essential industries in every district, including the most heavily immigrant neighborhoods in the city; and

WHEREAS, A broad coalition of labor unions and advocacy organizations, including SF Labor Council and all its affiliates, the Asian Law Caucus, SF Rising, Haiti Action Committee, California Collaborative for Immigrant Justice, Council on American-Islamic Relations (CAIR), Arab Resource and Organizing Center (AROC), San Francisco Immigrant Legal Defense Collaboration, San Francisco Immigrant Legal & Education Network, and the San Francisco Latino Task Force, have provided critical support to immigrant families and defended their right to peacefully assemble and protest the federal government's actions; and

WHEREAS, The use of militarized force by the National Guard or Federal armed forces to suppress lawful protests, especially in immigrant and working-class communities, threatens the ability of the public to exercise their First Amendment right to assemble; and

WHEREAS, Protests are not a breakdown of order but a response to injustice and a demand for accountability when institutions fail to uphold their obligations; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco affirms its unwavering support for the right to peaceful protest and recognizes it as foundational to a democratic society; and, be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board reaffirms San Francisco's Sanctuary City Ordinance; and, be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board condemns the deployment of military force in civilian settings, rejects the use of state violence to suppress peaceful protest, and denounces any federal action that threatens democratic governance, local autonomy, or constitutional checks and balances; and, be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board supports the State of California's legal challenge to the federal government's deployment of National Guard troops and affirms the importance of maintaining local and state authority over public safety; and, be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board commends the continued work of labor and community organizations who support immigrant families, defend civil liberties, and provide legal and mutual aid support; and, be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board declares that hope must be stronger than fear and that the voices of the people, including immigrants, workers, students, and families, must continue to illuminate the path forward for our democracy.
