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[Celebrating the 35th Anniversary of the Americans with Disabilities Act and Recognizing the Work of Disability Rights Leaders]

Resolution celebrating the 35th anniversary of the Americans with Disabilities Act, the work of disability rights leaders and the San Francisco Office on Disability and Accessibility, and the opening of the San Francisco Disability Cultural Center.

WHEREAS, July 26, 2025, marks the 35th anniversary of the signing of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA), a landmark civil rights law that prohibits discrimination against individuals with disabilities and guarantees equal access to public life; and

WHEREAS, The ADA has transformed the social and physical landscape of the United States (U.S.), promoting independence, equity, and inclusion for over 61 million Americans with disabilities; and

WHEREAS, San Francisco has a proud and rich history of being a welcoming and inclusive city for all, championing civil rights, disability rights, and social justice movements, including the historic Section 504 Sit-In of 1977 at the San Francisco Federal Building by a group of people with disabilities and their allies—the longest nonviolent occupation of a federal building in U.S. history—which galvanized the national disability rights movement and led to the implementation of Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act; and

WHEREAS, The City and County of San Francisco is celebrating the grand opening of the San Francisco Disability Cultural Center on July 17, 2025, the nation's first municipally funded disability center and a first-of-its-kind space dedicated to honoring the artistic, cultural, and civic contributions of the disability community; and

WHEREAS, The San Francisco Office on Disability and Accessibility (ODA), formerly the Mayor's Office on Disability, has been instrumental in leading citywide efforts to ensure

access to infrastructure, services, digital spaces, and civic engagement for residents and visitors with disabilities; and

WHEREAS, ODA has joined the Department of Disability and Aging Services (DAS), a move that will allow both organizations to combine their expertise and support greater alignment in working towards an inclusive City that is accessible for people with disabilities; and

WHEREAS, The San Francisco disability rights community continues to be inspired by the visionary leadership and pioneering work of women and feminists with disabilities, including groundbreaking advocates such as the late Judith ("Judy") Heumann, Debby Kaplan, Alice Wong, Sascha Bittner, the late Patty Berne, and many others whose efforts have expanded opportunity, equity, and justice across generations; and

WHEREAS, Judy Heumann, a tireless advocate who is often called the mother of the disability rights movement, was instrumental in founding key organizations such as Disabled In Action and the World Institute on Disability, led the historic 504 Sit-In to secure rights under the Rehabilitation Act, served as Assistant Secretary of the Office of Special Education and Rehabilitative Services under President Clinton, and throughout her life championed global disability rights initiatives that helped pave the way for the ADA and the United Nations (UN) Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities; and

WHEREAS, Debby Kaplan, a pioneering disability rights attorney and activist, co-founded the Disabled Women's Coalition at University of California (UC) Berkeley, founded the Disability Rights Center with Ralph Nader, served as an attorney for the Disability Rights Education and Defense Fund (DREDF), and led the World Institute on Disability, and now serves as Deputy Director of ODA, overseeing programmatic accessibility compliance, effective communication, and digital access; and

WHEREAS, Alice Wong, a prominent disability rights activist, writer, and community organizer based in San Francisco, is the founder and director of the Disability Visibility Project, an online community fostering and sharing disability media and culture; served on the National Council on Disability from 2013 to 2015; made history in 2015 by attending a White House event via telepresence robot; and continues to amplify disabled voices and advance disability justice through her writing, public speaking, and activism, including publishing "Disability Intimacy", "Disability Visibility", and "Year of the Tiger: An Activist's Life"; and

WHEREAS, Sascha Bittner, nationally recognized disability rights leader, whose decades of advocacy have advanced accessible transportation, housing, and home- and community-based care; through her work with Senior and Disability Action, Hand in Hand, and the In-Home Support Services (IHSS) Consumer Alliance, and in her role as a Commissioner on the San Francisco Disability and Aging Services Commission, has championed equity, independence, and dignity for people with disabilities; and

WHEREAS, Patty Berne, co-founder and Executive Director of Sins Invalid, was a visionary leader in the disability justice movement, whose work amplified the voices of disabled artists of color and queer and gender non-conforming people with disabilities, and who helped to define disability justice as a cultural and political framework centering intersectionality, access, and collective liberation; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the San Francisco Board of Supervisors hereby recognizes and celebrates the 35th Anniversary of the Americans with Disabilities Act; and, be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors celebrates the opening of the San Francisco Disability Cultural Center as a landmark achievement in promoting disability arts, culture, and civic engagement; and, be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors recognizes and commends the work of the San Francisco Office on Disability and Accessibility for its continued leadership in advancing equity, access, and inclusion across the City; and, be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors expresses its deepest appreciation to the many women and feminist leaders with disabilities, including the late Judy Heumann, the late Patty Berne, Debby Kaplan, Alice Wong, Sascha Bittner, and countless others who have fought tirelessly to ensure the full and equal participation of people with disabilities in all aspects of life.
