Updated MOU for the Free City College Program]

Resolution urging the Department of Children, Youth, and Their Families to uphold the principles of the Free City College program by expeditiously negotiating an updated Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with the San Francisco Community College District.

[Urging the Department of Children, Youth, and Their Families to Expeditiously Negotiate an

WHEREAS, In 2016, The voters of San Francisco and the Board of Supervisors overwhelmingly supported the creation of the groundbreaking Free City College program to make City College of San Francisco tuition free for San Franciscans and provide additional support for those already on financial aid; and

WHEREAS, In 2017, The first Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between the City and City College created a pilot program so that any San Francisco resident taking credit courses would be eligible for the Free City College program to offset enrollment fees and other education related financial support; and

WHEREAS, In 2019, a new, 10-year MOU established a long-term funding commitment and expanded the Free City College program, with the City contributing a CPI indexed amount, starting with \$15 million in Fiscal Year (FY) 2019-2020 subject to budgetary and fiscal provisions of the Charter; and

WHEREAS, Free City College served approximately 78,000 students from 2019-2023, with nearly 17,000 San Franciscans accessing higher education through Free City College in 2022-23; and

WHEREAS, In 2024, due to the City's looming \$800 million deficit as well as declined enrollment in the Free City College program during the pandemic, the City intends to cover the full expenses of the program without putting CCSF or the program into a deficit, but has

reduced appropriations from \$16.9 million to \$9.3 million for Fiscal Year (FY) 2024-2025 and to \$7.2 million in Fiscal Year (FY) 2025-2026; and

WHEREAS, The Free City College MOU created a reserve fund to ensure the flexibility to withstand fiscal and enrollment changes and included a provision for reserves to be returned to the City if in excess of 50% of the annual allocation; and

WHEREAS, In the past several years, the program has accumulated both reserve funds and unspent funds that the City intends to access to help close the current budget gap; and

WHEREAS, While the change in financial circumstances necessitates the negotiation of an updated MOU, this should not override the basic tenets of the Free City College program and its mission of educational access and opportunity for San Franciscans; and

WHEREAS, The City is still obligated to fulfill its commitment to the purpose and vision for Free City College, which is based on the premise that every San Franciscan should have access to advancing their educational and career goals; and

WHEREAS, The Free City College Oversight Committee, with its diverse representation of stakeholders and depth of consideration for the program, has explored and proposed numerous program improvements, enhancements, and expansions to further support equity and San Francisco's most vulnerable students, including the successful elimination of outstanding student debt from 2017-2022; and

WHEREAS, City College credit enrollment is increasing, with Fall 2024 currently at 14% over Fall 2023, while Spring 2024 was 12% over Spring 2023, which will in turn increase the number of students accessing the Free City College program; and

WHEREAS, The long-term sustainability and stability of City College is dependent on increasing enrollment, with Free City College acting as an important factor to attract and retain San Francisco students;

WHEREAS, While enrollment has declined across many State educational institutions, there must be interventions to reverse this trend; and

WHEREAS, Free City College was developed to serve a diverse range of students, including but not limited to workers in need of training and re-training, low-income and immigrant communities, veterans and the disabled, lifelong learners, first-generation college attendees, full and part-time students in need of second and third changes, as well as students transferring to four-year institutions; and

WHEREAS, The City of San Francisco as a whole and our democracy benefits from a more educated and skilled populace and fostering a college-going culture in the City; and

WHEREAS, City College remains an integral part of San Francisco's economic recovery in supporting workforce development and skill enhancement programs that support the success of residents; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors urges the DCYF to negotiate an updated MOU for the Free City College program with City College in good faith, with guidance and participation from the Free City College Oversight Committee throughout the process, that ensures its long-term success and that upholds the basic principles of the program to offer all San Francisco residents access to education; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors urges DCYF and City College to ensure that the MOU centers equity and offers more support for vulnerable students with the least opportunities for other financial aid and who face other hardships in pursuing their education; be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors urges DCYF and City College to consider expanding other collaborations to increase participation in Free City College through more robust partnerships with the Office of Economic Workforce Development, Department of Early Childhood, and other agencies that have workforce programs; be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors urges DCYF and City College to ensure that an updated MOU for the Free City College program does not add more operational barriers such as means-testing students or restricting eligible courses; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors urges DCYF and City College to collaborate and include in the updated MOU more robust data collection and sharing on the students in the program, as well as clearer processes for timely and accurate information about the program's work and impact for San Franciscans; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors urges DCYF and City College to consider the fiscal health for both the City and City College while also ensuring that financial contributions for the Free City College Fund is both secure and responsive to future increased enrollment and participation; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors hereby directs the Clerk of the Board, upon passage, to transmit copies of this Resolution to the Director of the Department of Children, Youth, and Their Families; the Interim Chancellor of the City College of San Francisco; the City College Board of Trustees, and the Free City College Oversight Committee.
